Moreover, direct international wires are slow and often subject to bank spot check hold ups when funds are wired to student accommodation properties, due to anti-money laundering (AML) rules being triggered.

When students arrive in their destination country, they will set up a local debit bank account, which helps them navigate away from the expensive payment platforms. 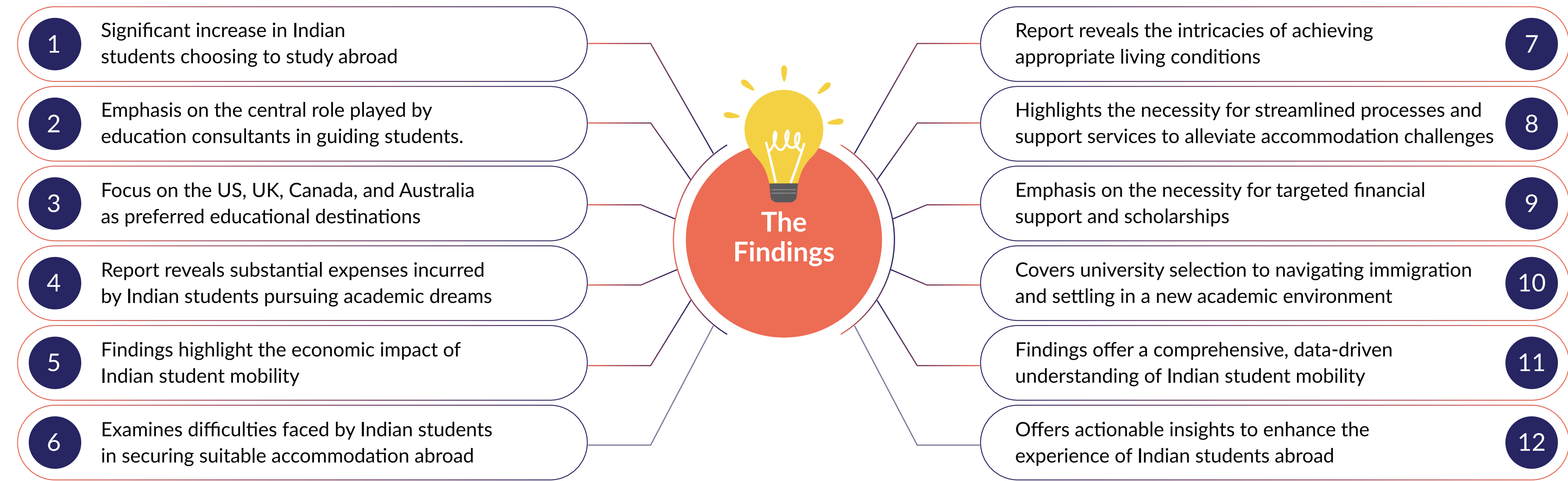

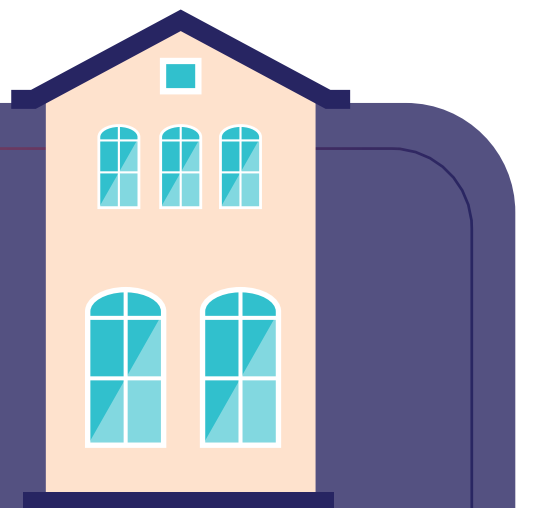

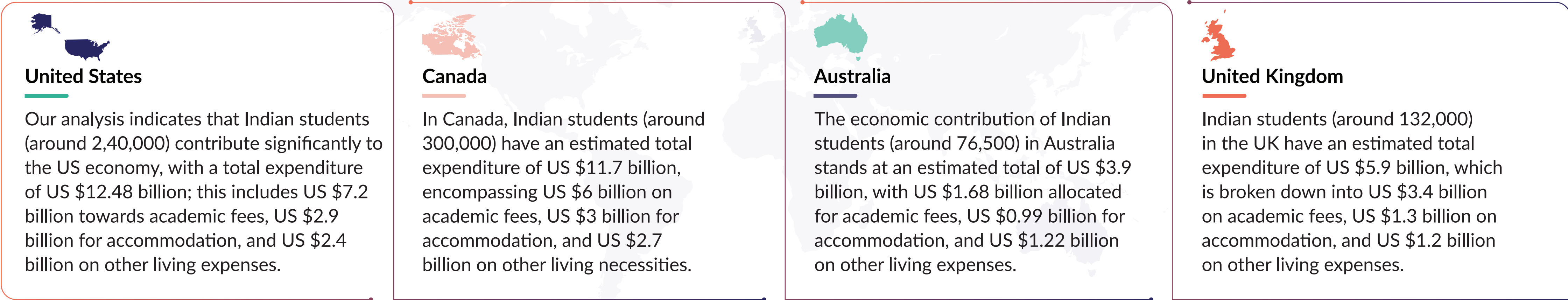

There were close to 1,200 Universities, 49,400 colleges, and 12,600 Standalone Institutions in India making it the largest higher education ecosystem in the world by number of institutions.



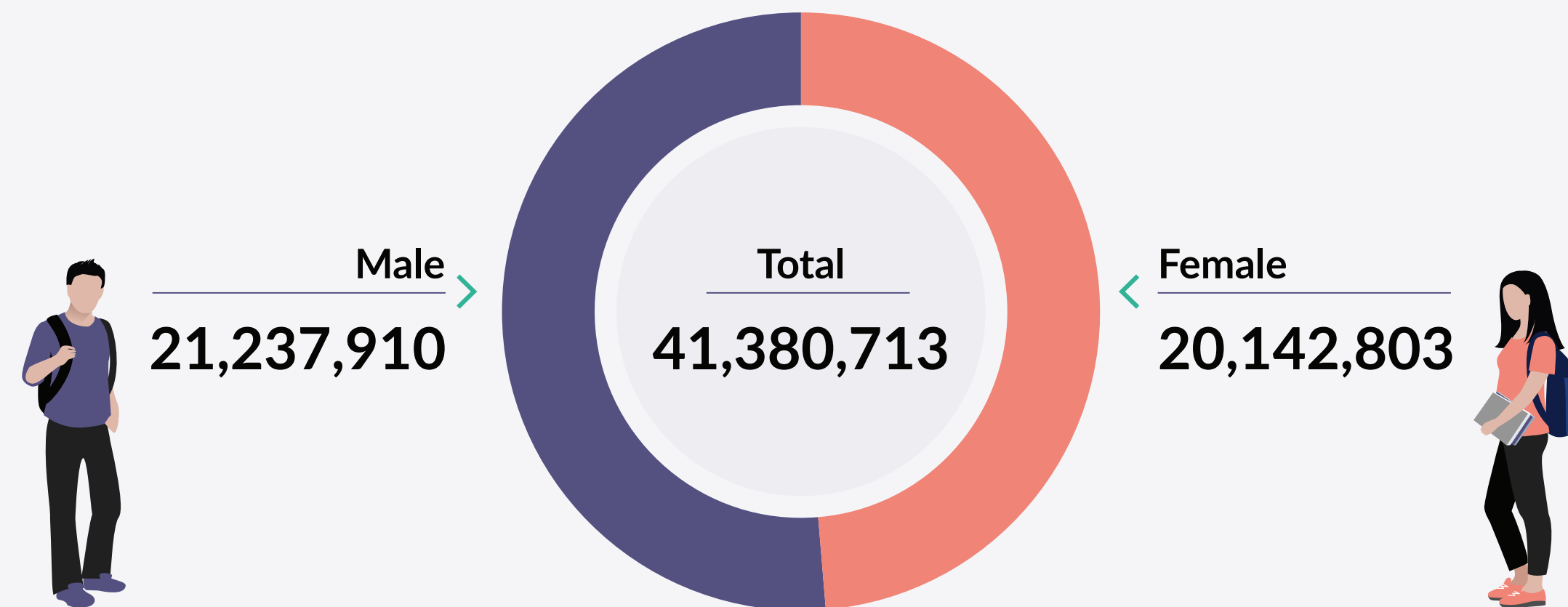
Indian Higher Education System consists of 41 mn students and 1.55 mn faculty members across various HEIs. Still our GER of ~27% is much lower than most developed countries of the world.



The Market size of Indian Higher Education system was estimated around \$40 bn in 2023 growing at a CAGR of 15%.

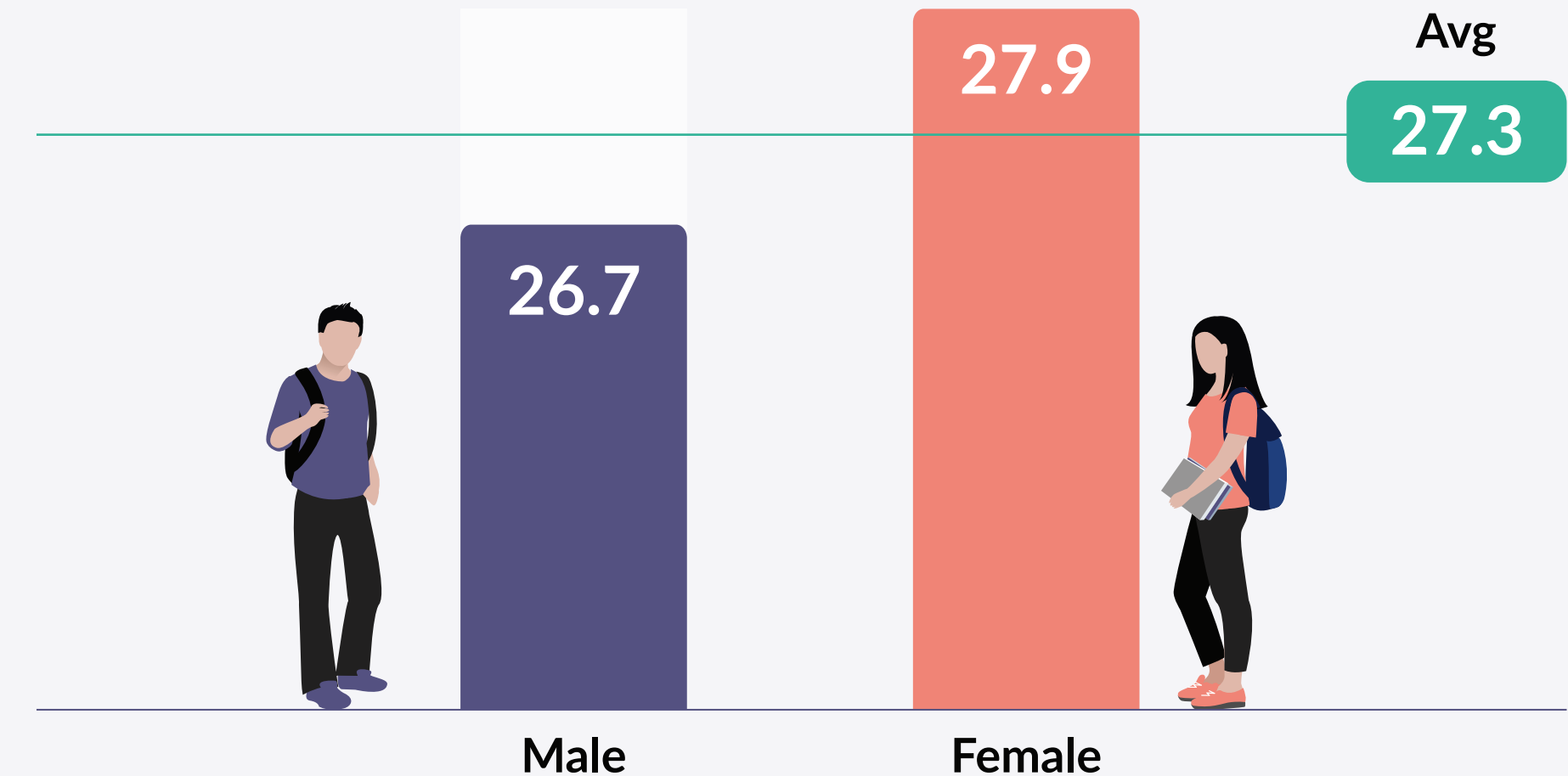
HE Enrollment By Gender All Categories

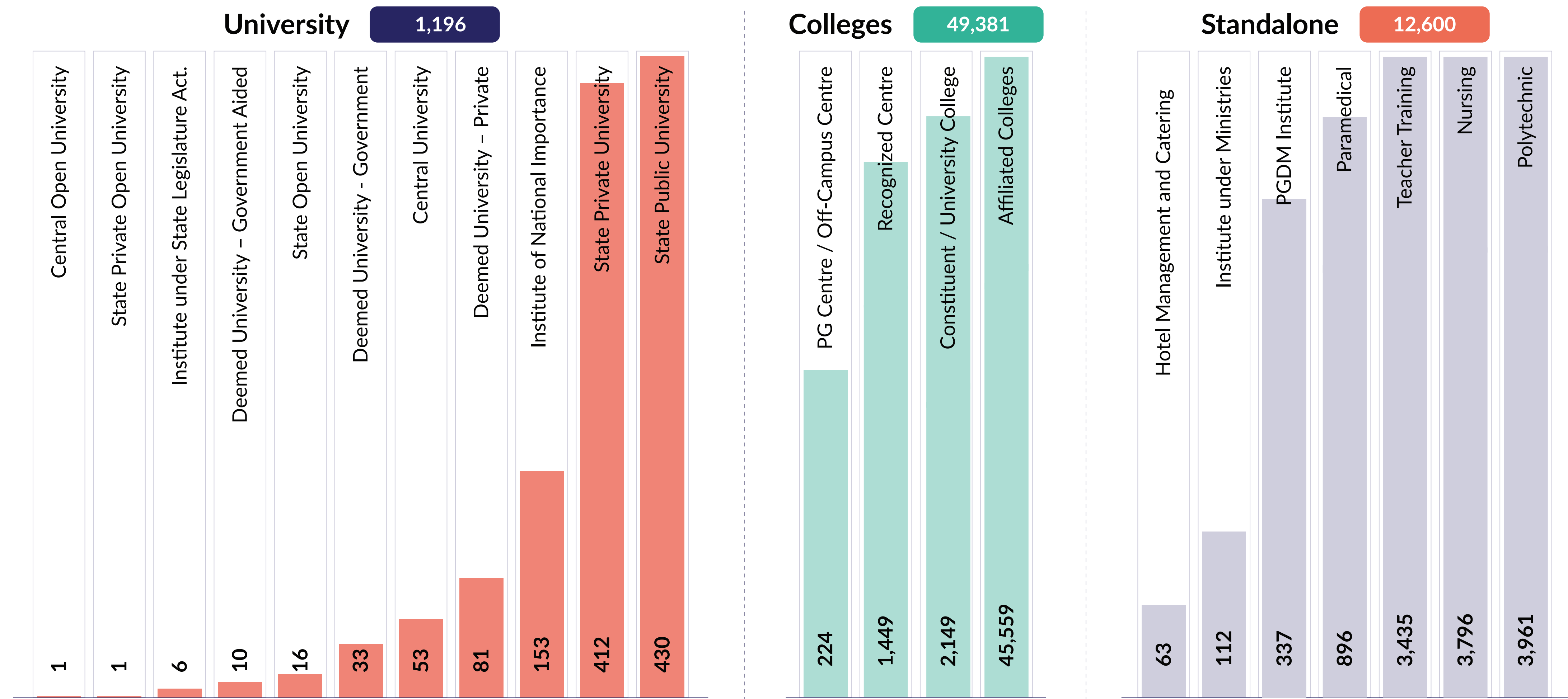

Challenges in the Indian Higher Education Sector

The key challenges of the Indian Higher Education Sector:



Quality and Quantity Mismatch

Lack of Top-Ranking Institutes

No Indian institutes appear in the Top 200 of global university rankings, indicating a quality issue.

Supply-Demand Gap

The system lacks the capacity to absorb the increasing number of students coming out of high school. To meet the GER targets, India needs to create an additional capacity of about 25 million seats over the next decade, requiring thousands of new institutions.

Gross Enrollment Ratios (GER)

India's GER in higher education is significantly lower than the global average. The country has set ambitious GER targets that it is unlikely to meet, given the current rate of growth.



Outdated Curriculum

Old Curriculum

Many Indian higher education institutions have curriculum that were last revamped almost four decades ago.

Lack of Modern Skills

The current curriculum does not adequately prepare students for modern challenges or equip them with practical and technical skills.

Lack of Job-Oriented Curriculum

There is a need for a curriculum that improves employability and encourages entrepreneurship.



Regulatory and Policy Issues

Private Sector Involvement

While the private sector accounts for 59% of enrollment in higher education, the regulatory environment is not conducive for high-quality private institutions.

Regulatory Overlap and Complexity

The Indian higher education sector is overseen by multiple regulatory bodies which can lead to overlapping jurisdictions and regulatory complexities, making it difficult for institutions to navigate the system.

Exhibit 4: Country wise No. of Universities in Top 200



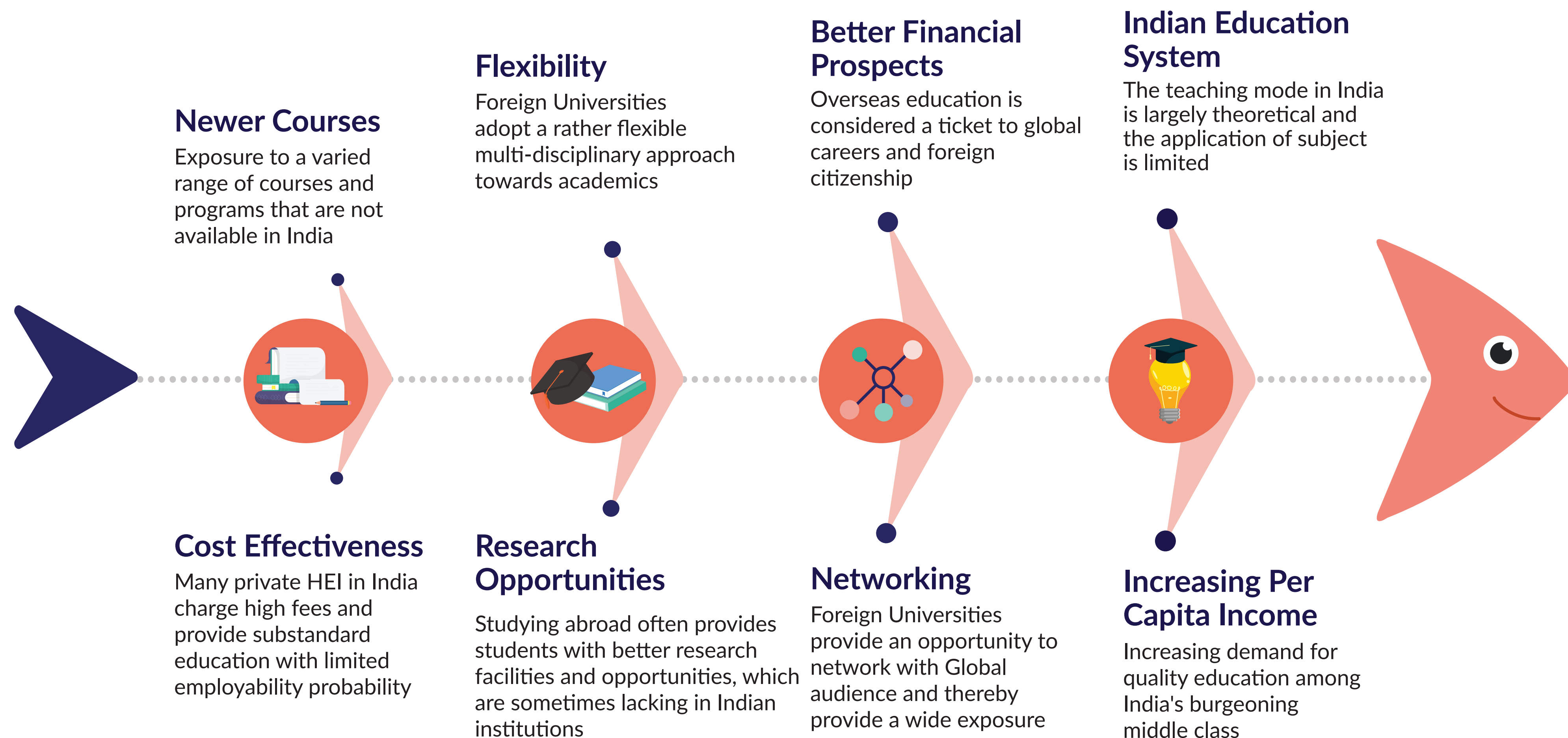

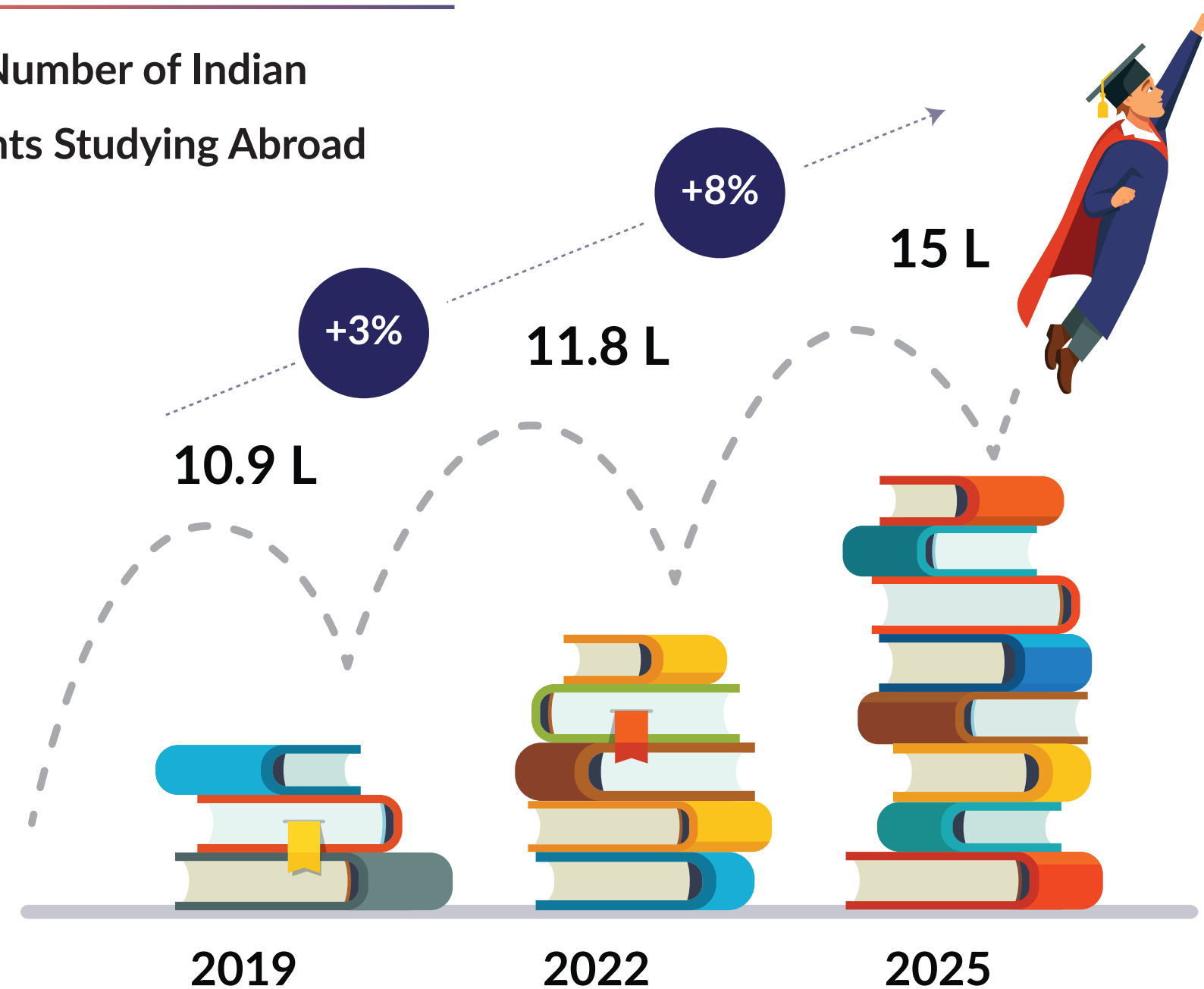
Exhibit 5: Reasons for Migration of Indian Students

Total Number of Indian Students Studying Abroad



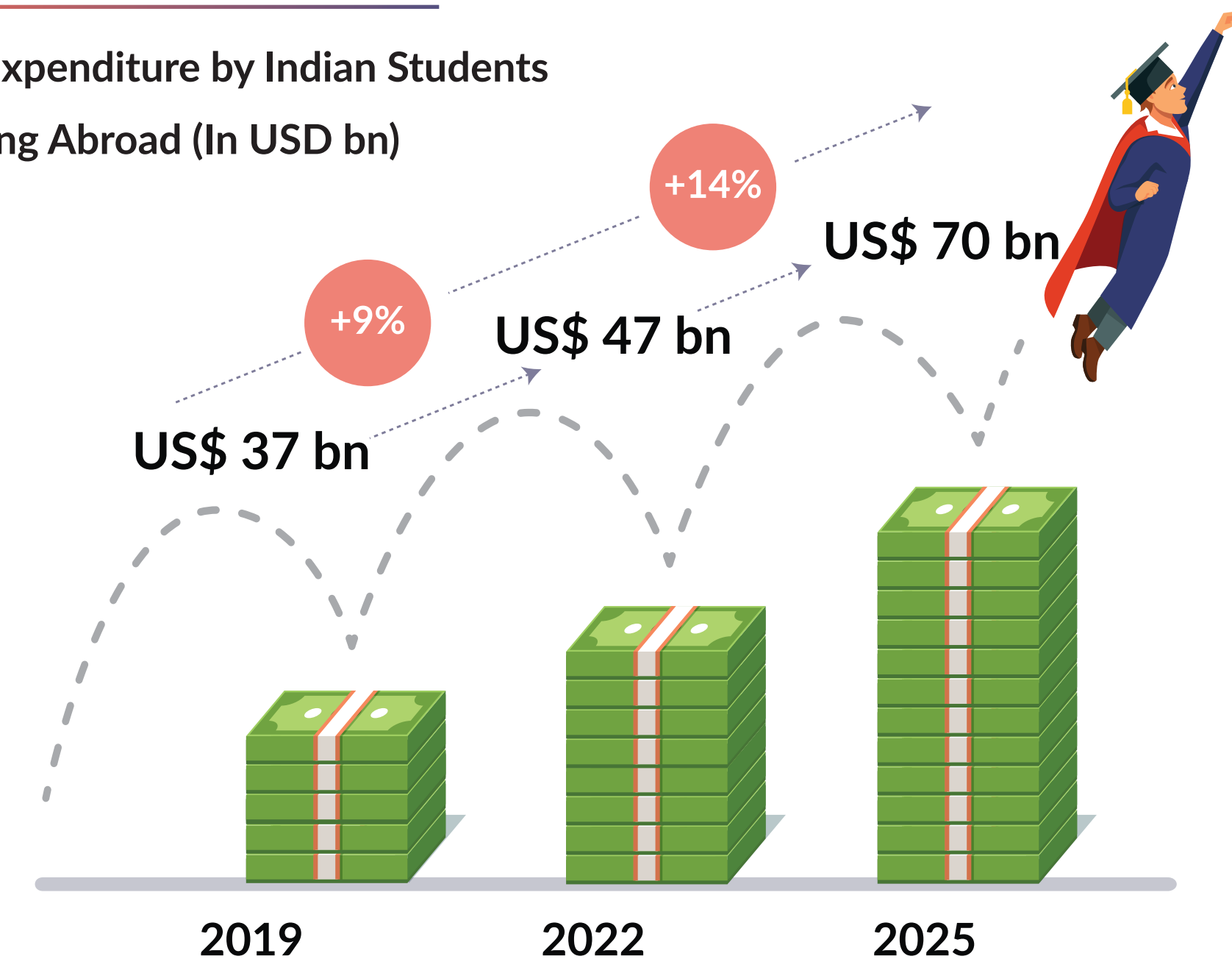

In 2019, approximately 10.9 Lakhs Indian students pursued their education abroad. This figure witnessed a 3% growth in 2022, escalating to around 11.8 Lakhs students.

If the current growth rate of 8% sustains, the number of Indian students studying overseas is projected to soar to approximately 15 Lakhs by the year 2025.

In 2019, Indian students spent an estimated US\$ 37 bn on education abroad. This expenditure experienced a 9% surge in 2022, reaching a substantial US\$ 47 bn.

If the sector continues to grow at the current rate of 14%, the projected spending by Indian students on overseas education is expected to skyrocket to an astounding US\$ 70 bn by the year 2025.

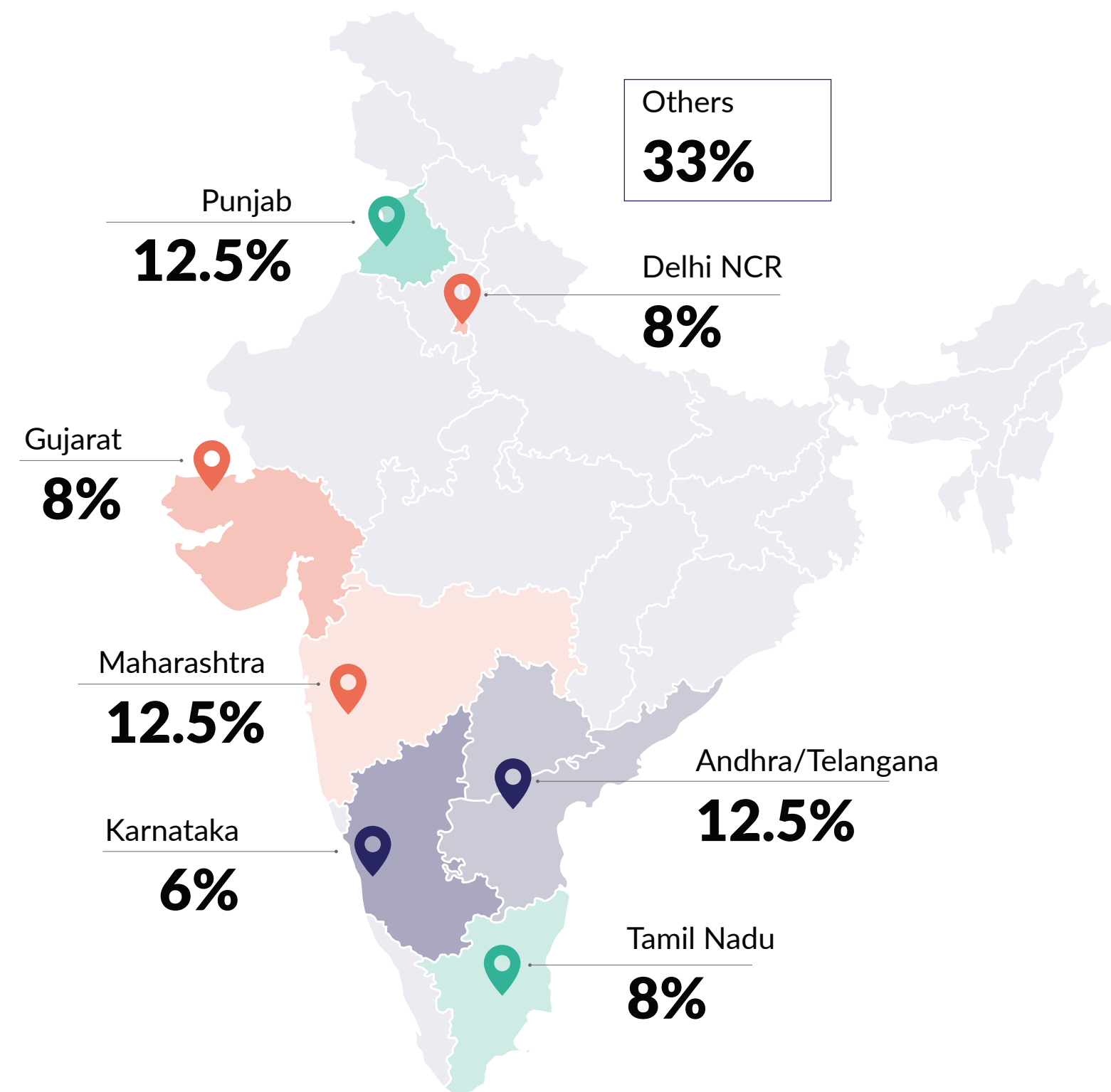


Destination Analysis for Study Abroad

Overview

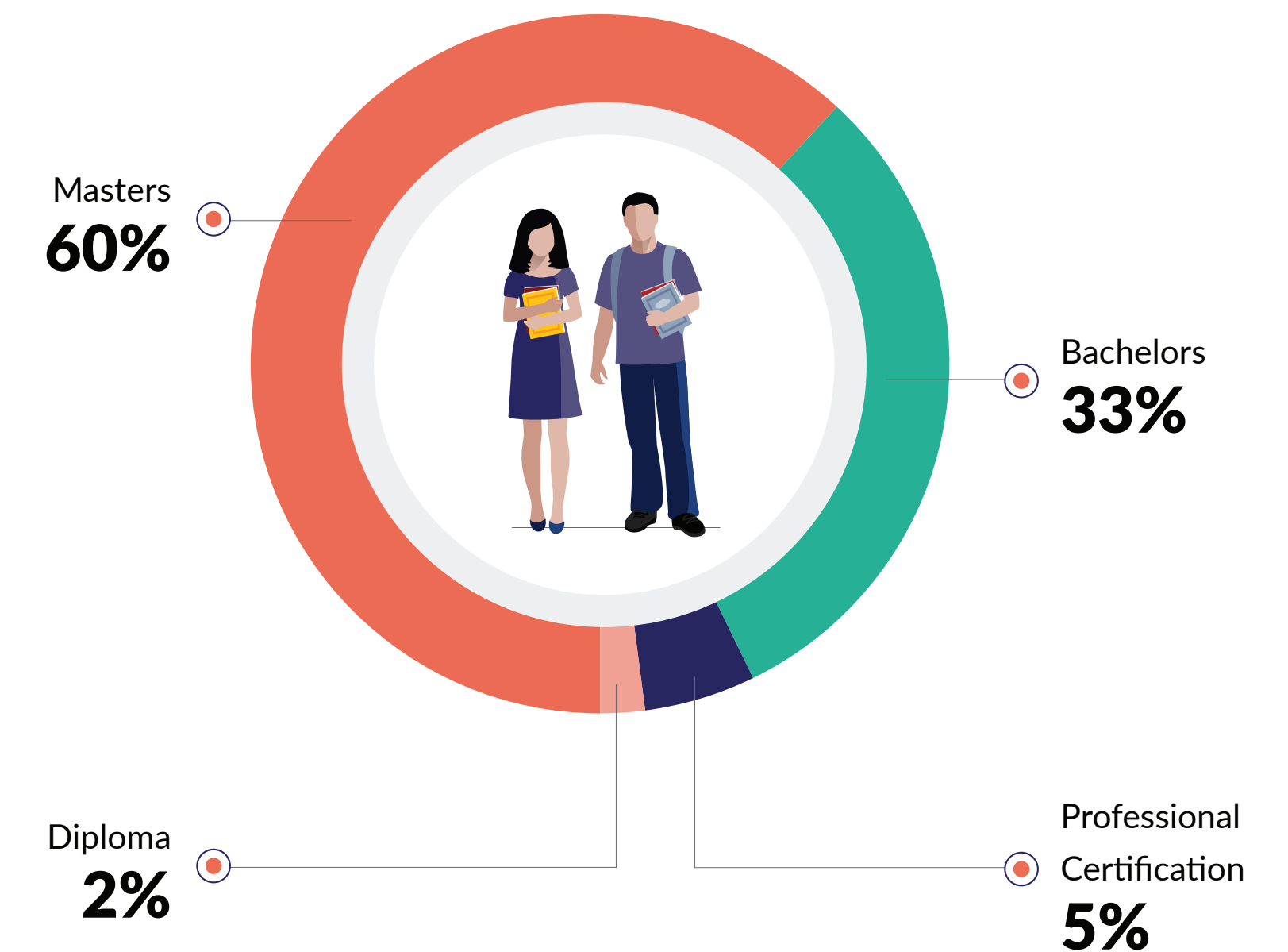
- As per our estimates, around 1.2 mn students were pursuing their study abroad in 2022, out of which around 0.75 mn students had gone abroad in that year itself.
- We estimate that this number is likely to reach 1.3 mn by the end of 2023, out of which 0.75 mn (58%) are expected to be pursuing higher education across Canada, US, UK and Australia.
- Traditionally Indian students have preferred countries like - US, Canada, UK and Australia. However, recently other countries have also emerged as preferred destinations, including Germany, Kyrgyzstan, Ireland, Singapore, Russia, Philippines, France, and New Zealand.
- Top States in India in terms of students going abroad include - Punjab, Haryana, Andhra Pradesh, Telangana, Kerala, Maharashtra, Delhi/NCR and Tamil Nadu.

Exhibit 8: Indian Student Studying Abroad ('23) by States



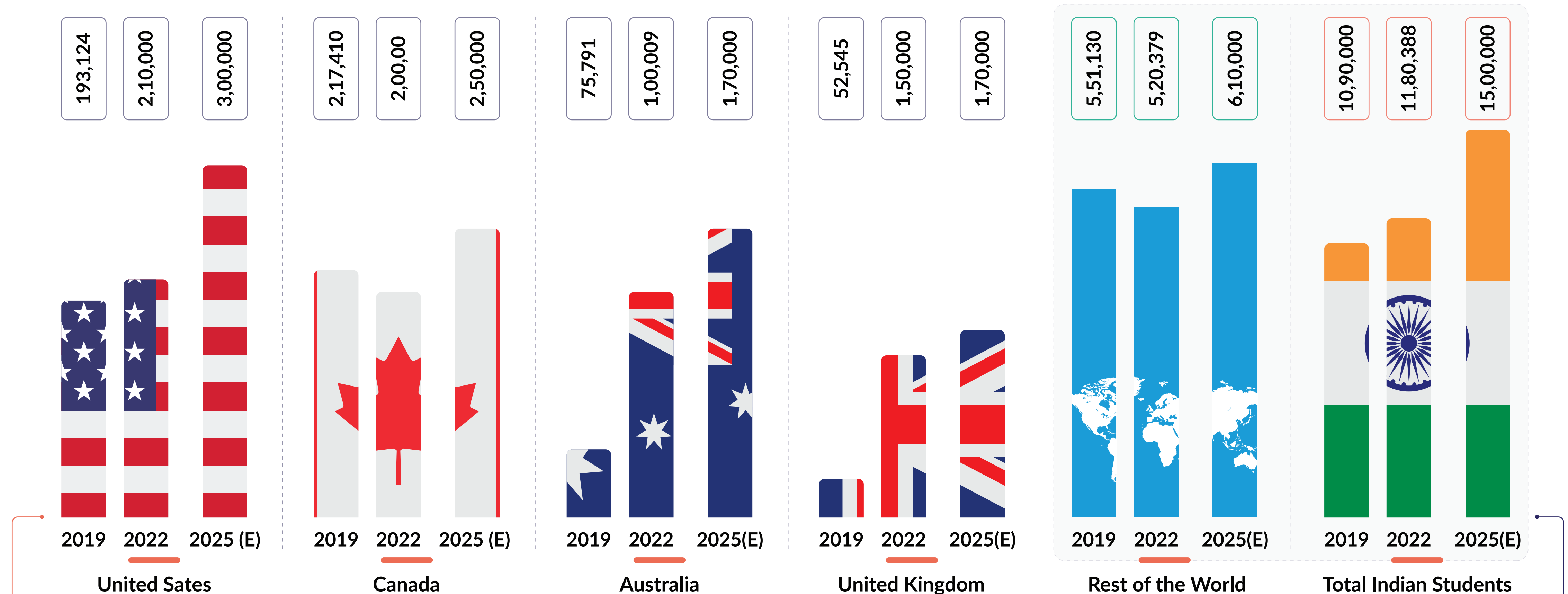

Exhibit 10: Indian Students & Study Abroad Destinations

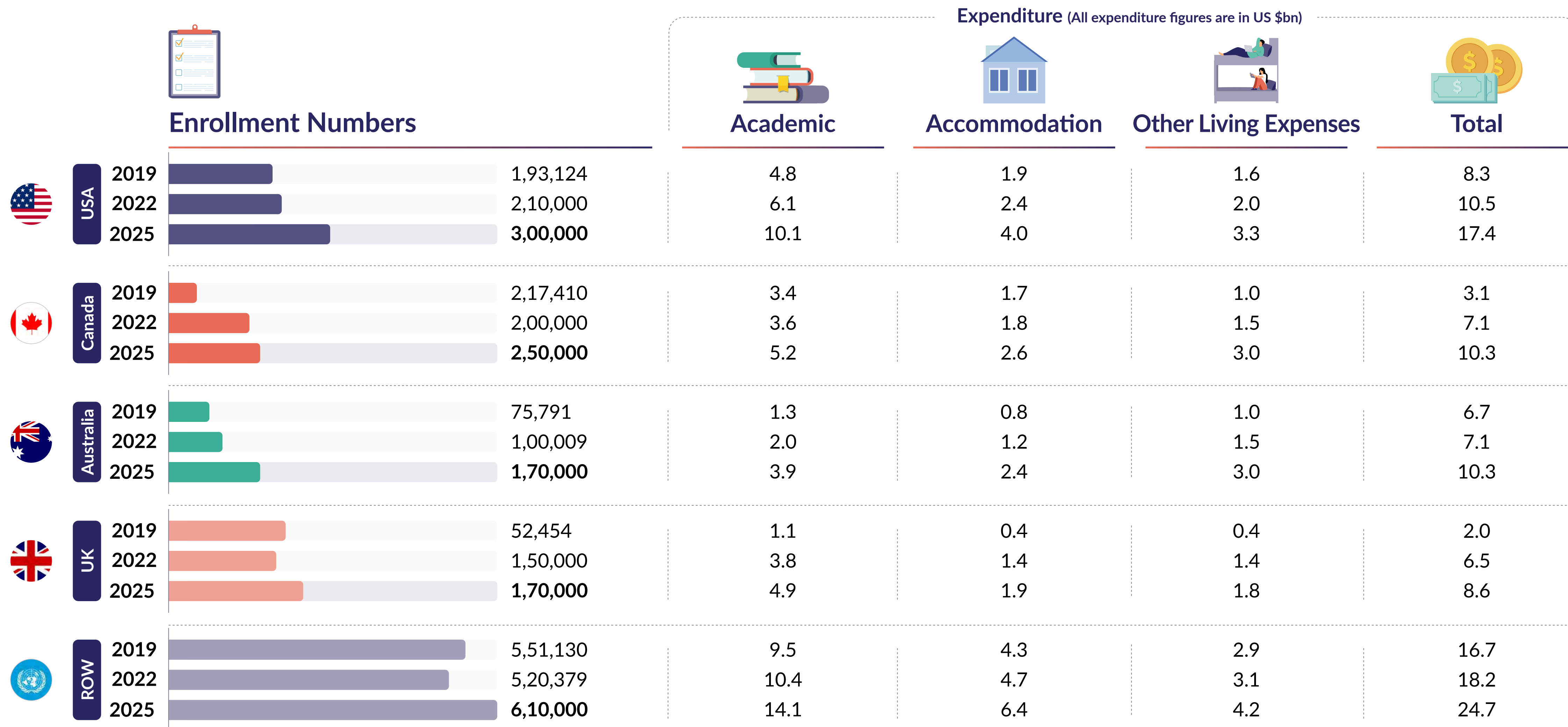

During our research it was observed that there were different numbers of Indian students studying abroad, published by different Govt. Authorities. However, we have considered numbers which we felt were more realistic.

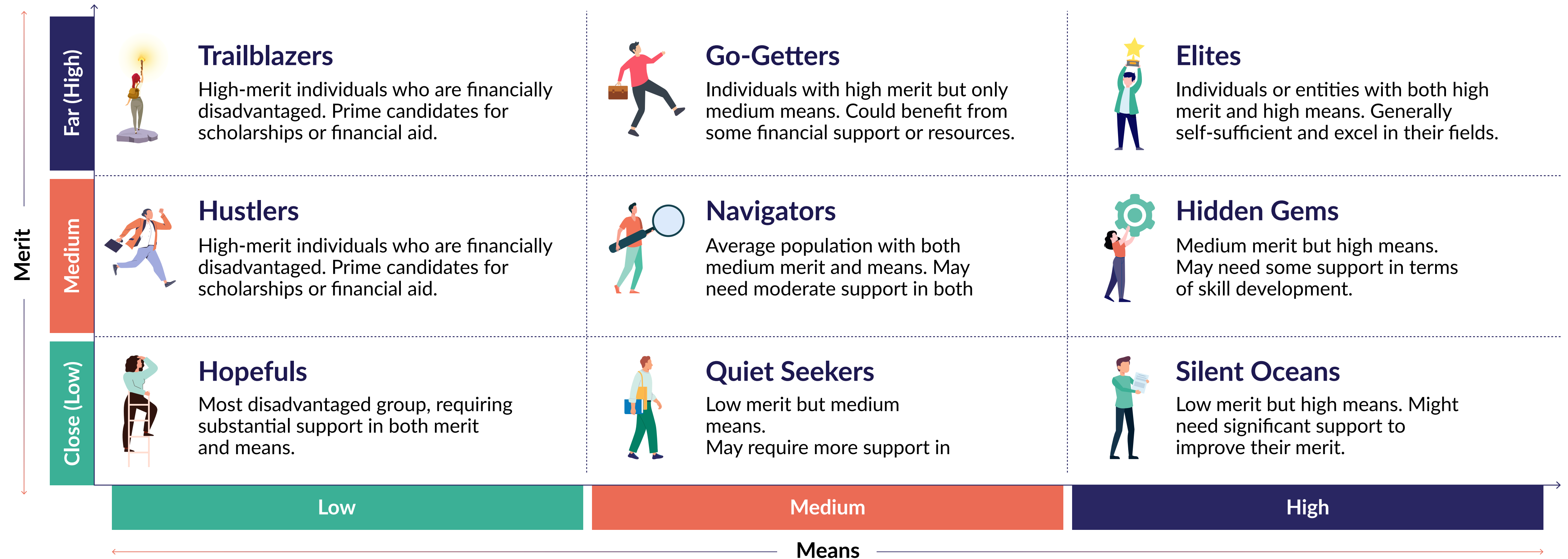

Exhibit 13: Study Abroad Market Trends

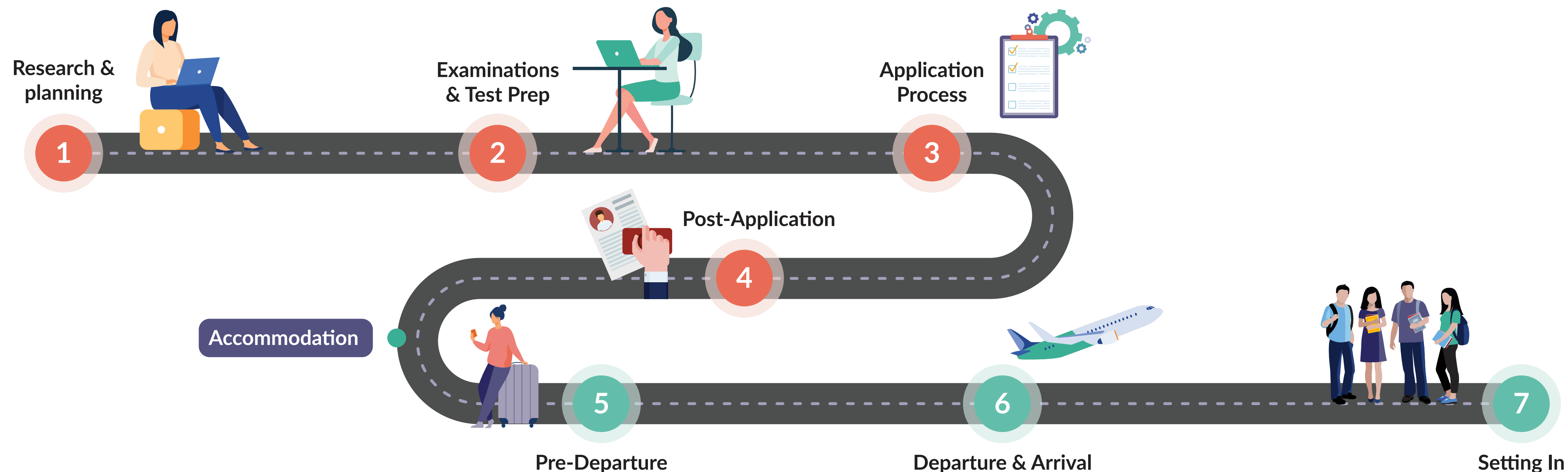

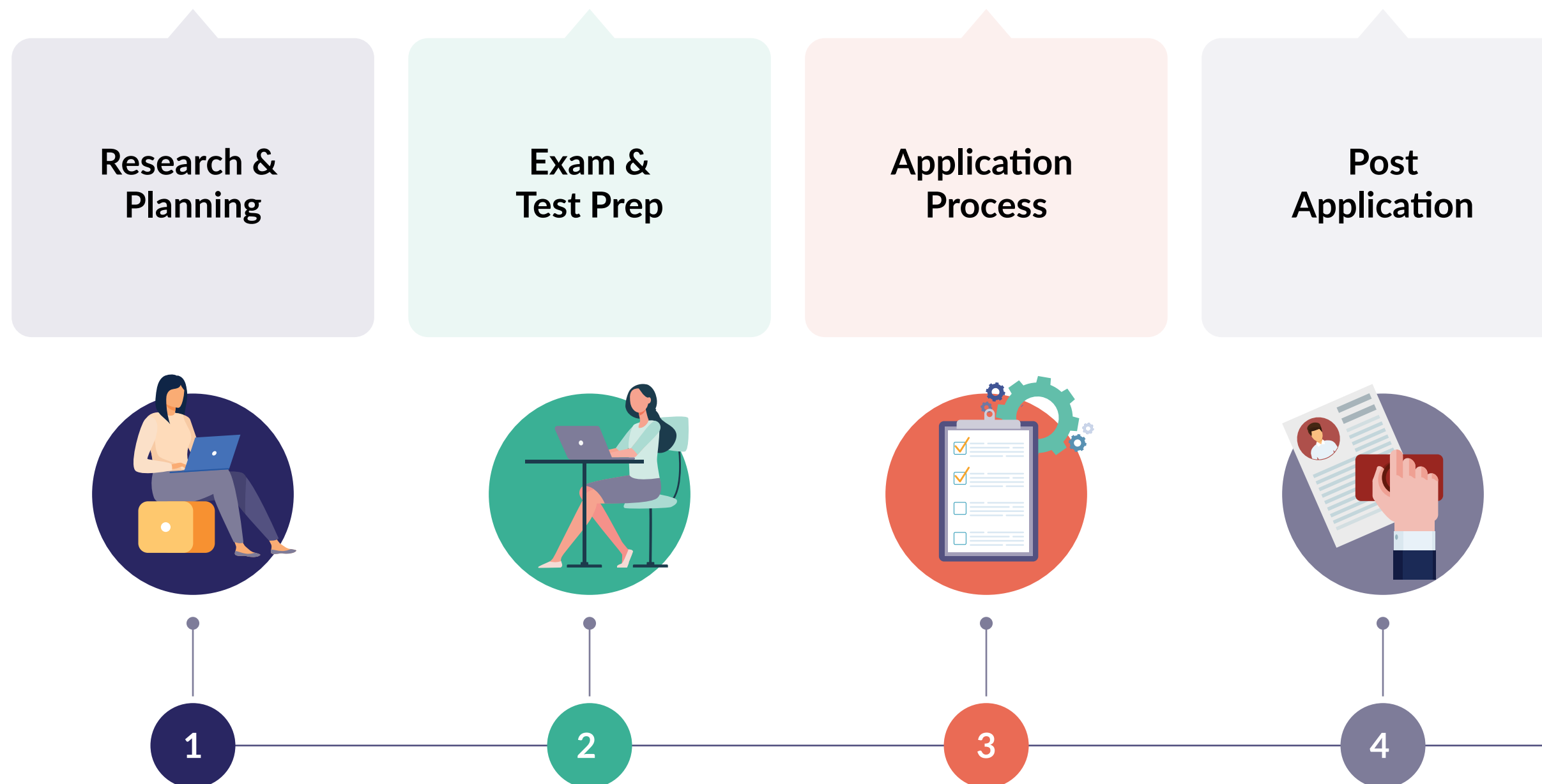

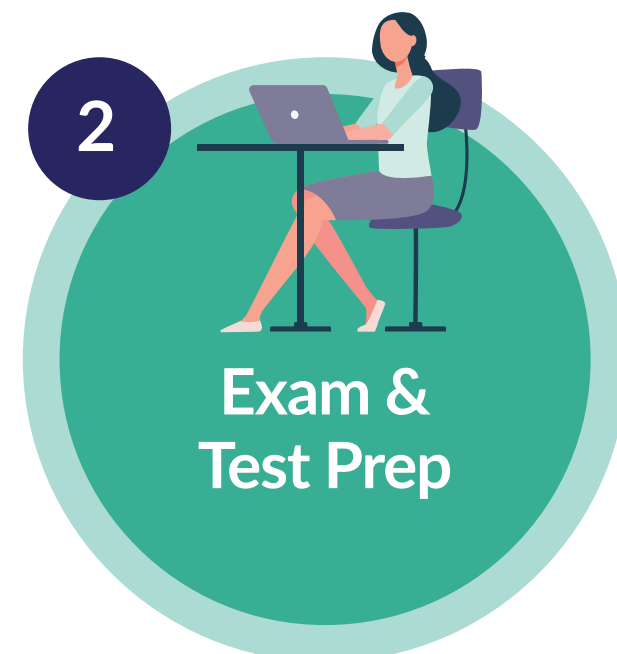

Structure of Higher Education in the US

Undergraduate Programs

- **Associate Degree** ▶ Typically a 2-year program, often offered at community colleges.
- **Bachelor's Degree** ▶ A 4-year program offered at universities and colleges.

Postgraduate Programs

- **Master's Degree:** ▶ Usually a 2-year program following the completion of a bachelor's degree.
- **Doctorate (Ph.D.)** ▶ Takes 3-8 years and involves extensive research.

Professional Degrees

- **MBA** ▶ Master of Business Administration
- **MD** ▶ Doctor of Medicine
- **JD** ▶ Juris Doctor (Law)



Types of Institutions

Public Universities

- Funded by the state government.

Private Universities

- Privately funded and more expensive.

Community Colleges

- Offer associate degrees and vocational courses

Liberal Arts Colleges

- Focus on a well-rounded education.

Admissions Process

Standardized Tests

- SAT/ACT for undergraduate and GRE/GMAT for postgraduate courses

Essays and SOPs

- Personal statements and essays are crucial.

Letters of Recommendation

- Usually two or three are required.

Transcripts

- Academic records from previous institutions.

Interviews

- Some universities conduct interviews, either in-person or via video conferencing.



Financial Aspects

Tuition Fees

- Vary widely depending on the institution

Assistantships

- Teaching and research assistantships can help offset costs.

Student Accommodation

- Mix of Off Campus and On Campus

Scholarships

- Numerous scholarships are available for international students

Loans

- Both federal and private loans are options, though international students may need a U.S. co-signer.

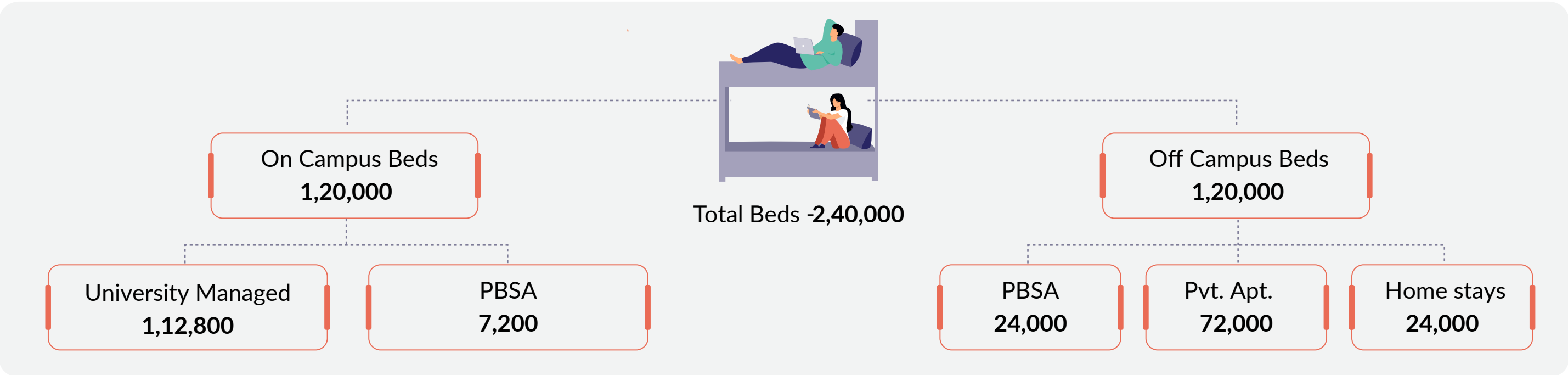

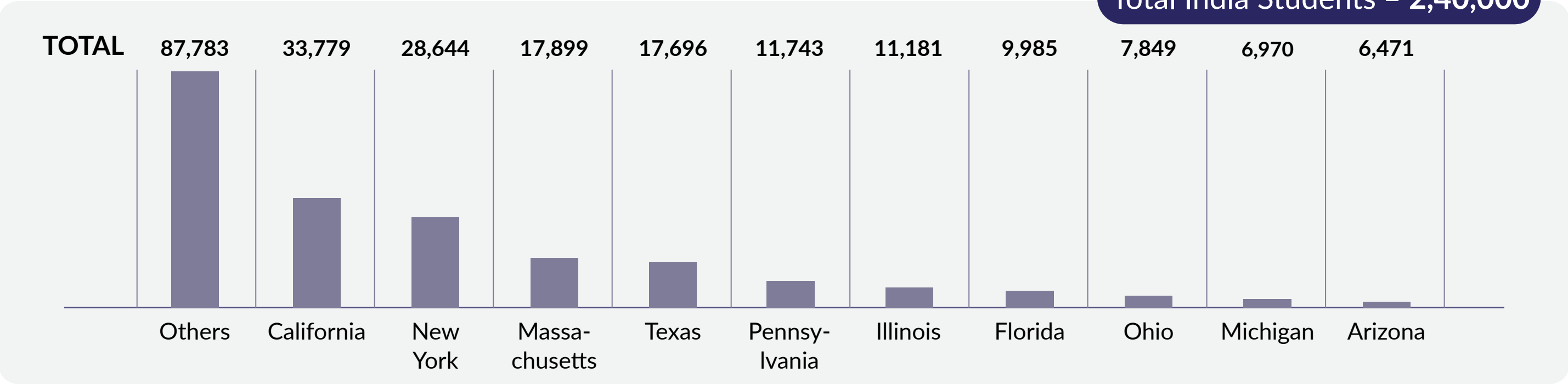
Exhibit 19: Details of Beds for Indian Students in Higher Education (2023)

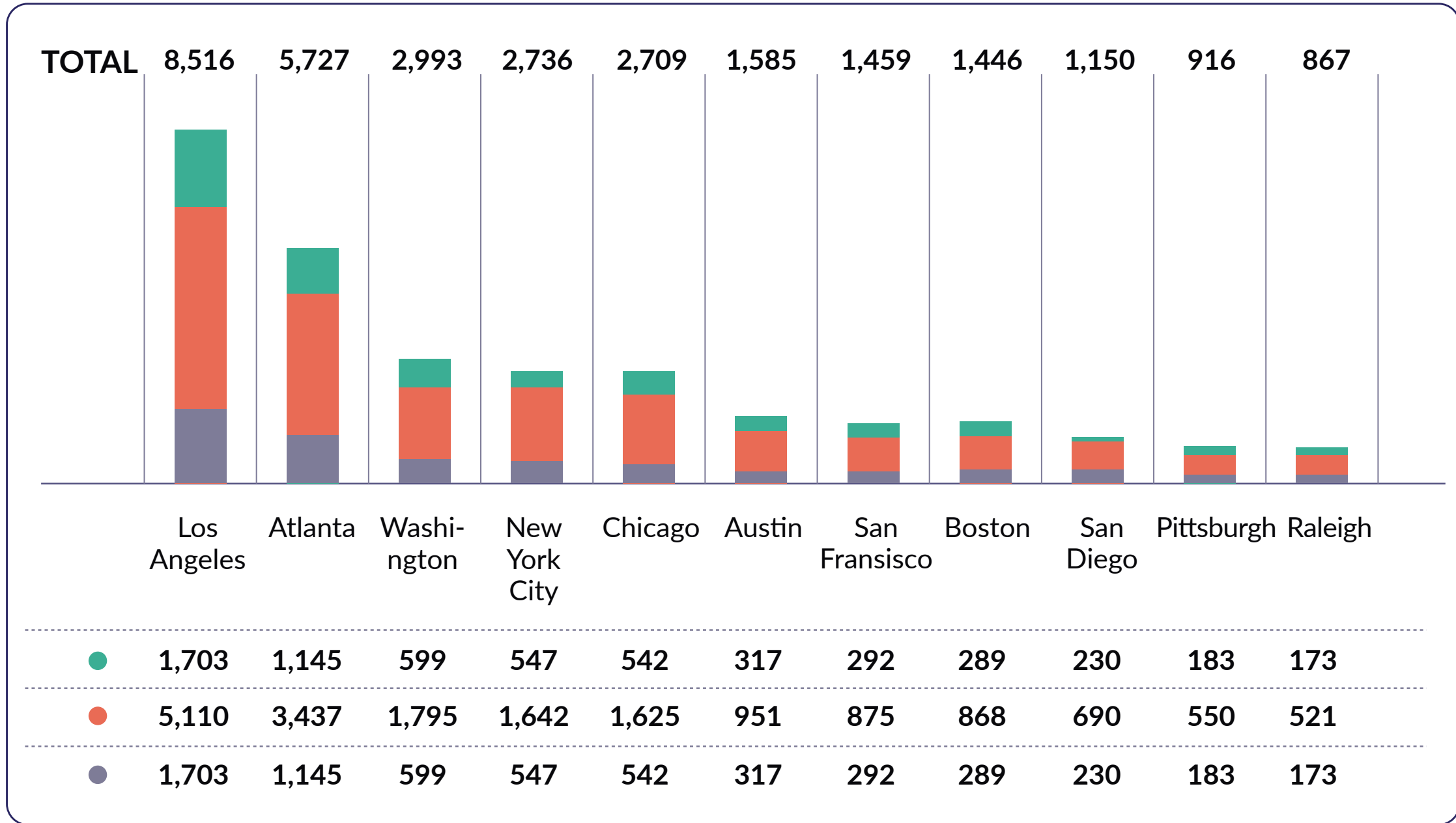

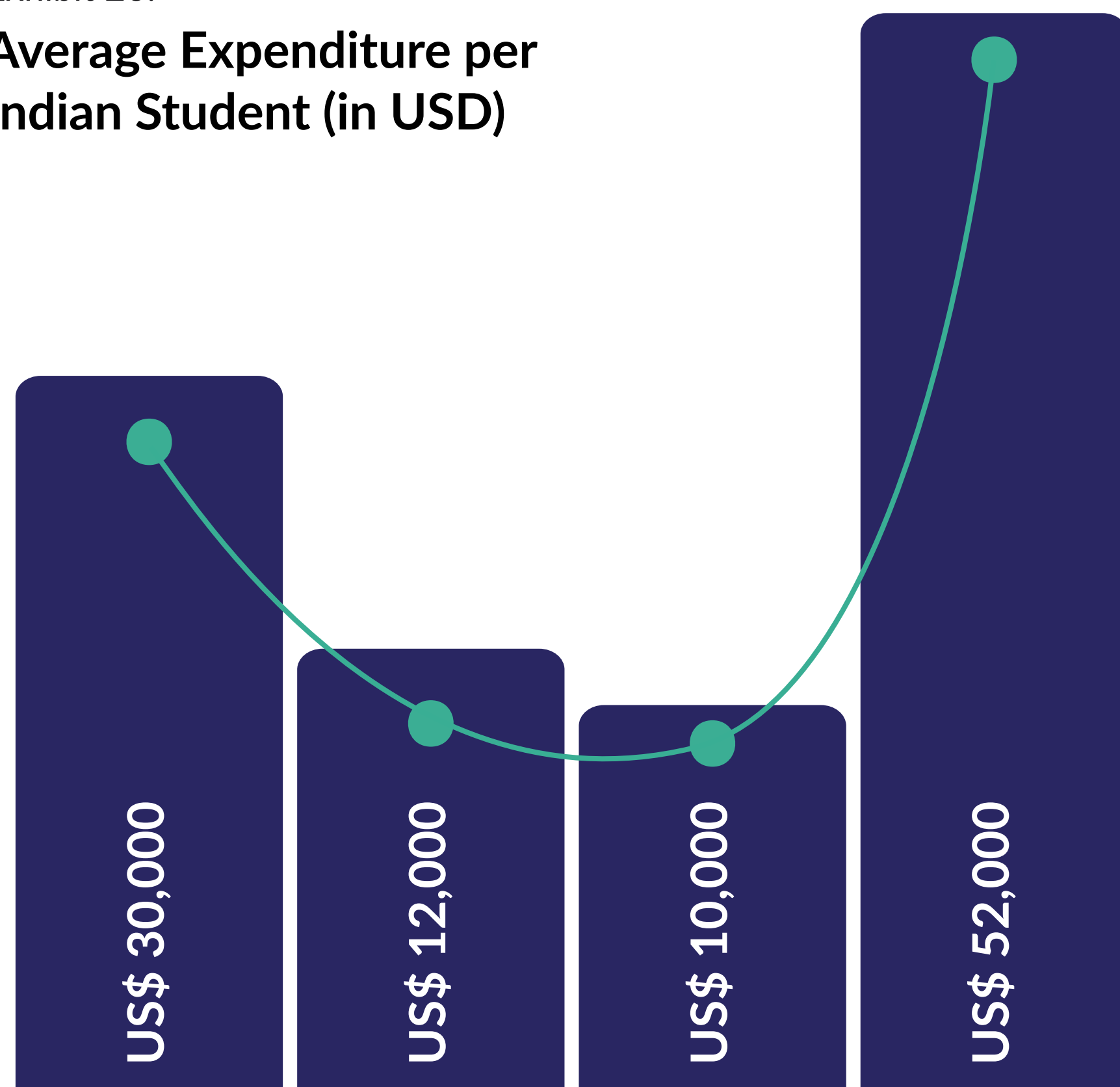

Visa Requirements

A student visa (F or M) is required to study in the United States. Foreign nationals may not study after entering on a visitor (B) visa or through the Visa Waiver Program (VWP), except to undertake recreational study (non-credit) as part of a tourist visit.



The United States Department of State has announced a much-needed update for international students looking to study in the US. Starting from March 1st, 2023-2024, prospective F-1 student visa applicants can now apply up to 365 days before their academic term begins.

Some Important Immigration Updates

This change means that universities can now accept and issue I-20 forms 12-14 months before term time, giving students more time to complete the visa application process. However, students will still only be allowed to travel to the US on the visa 30 days before the start of their program.

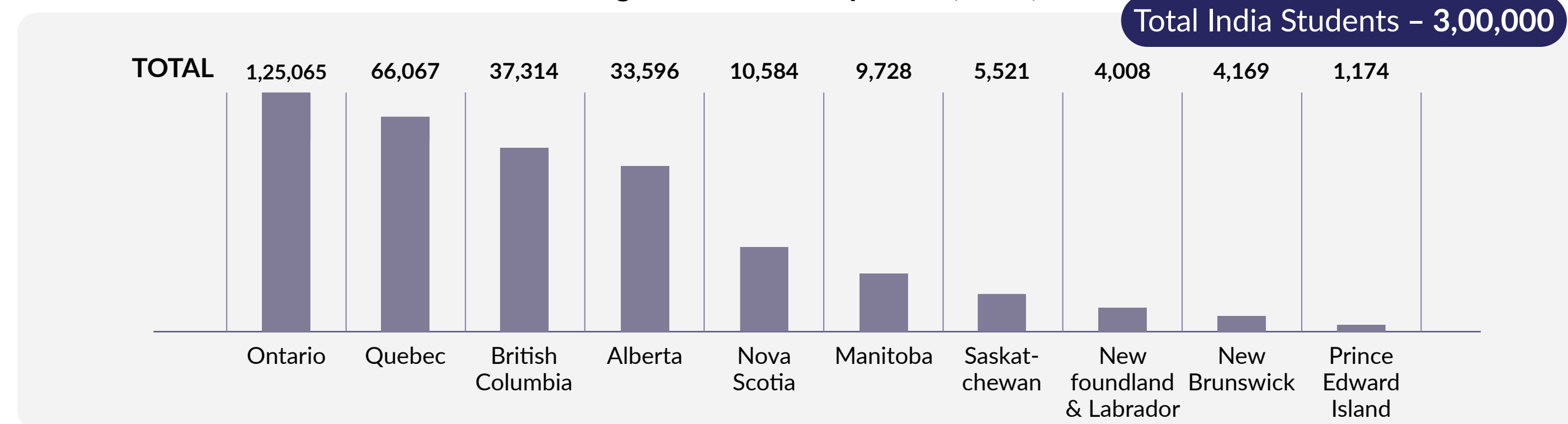

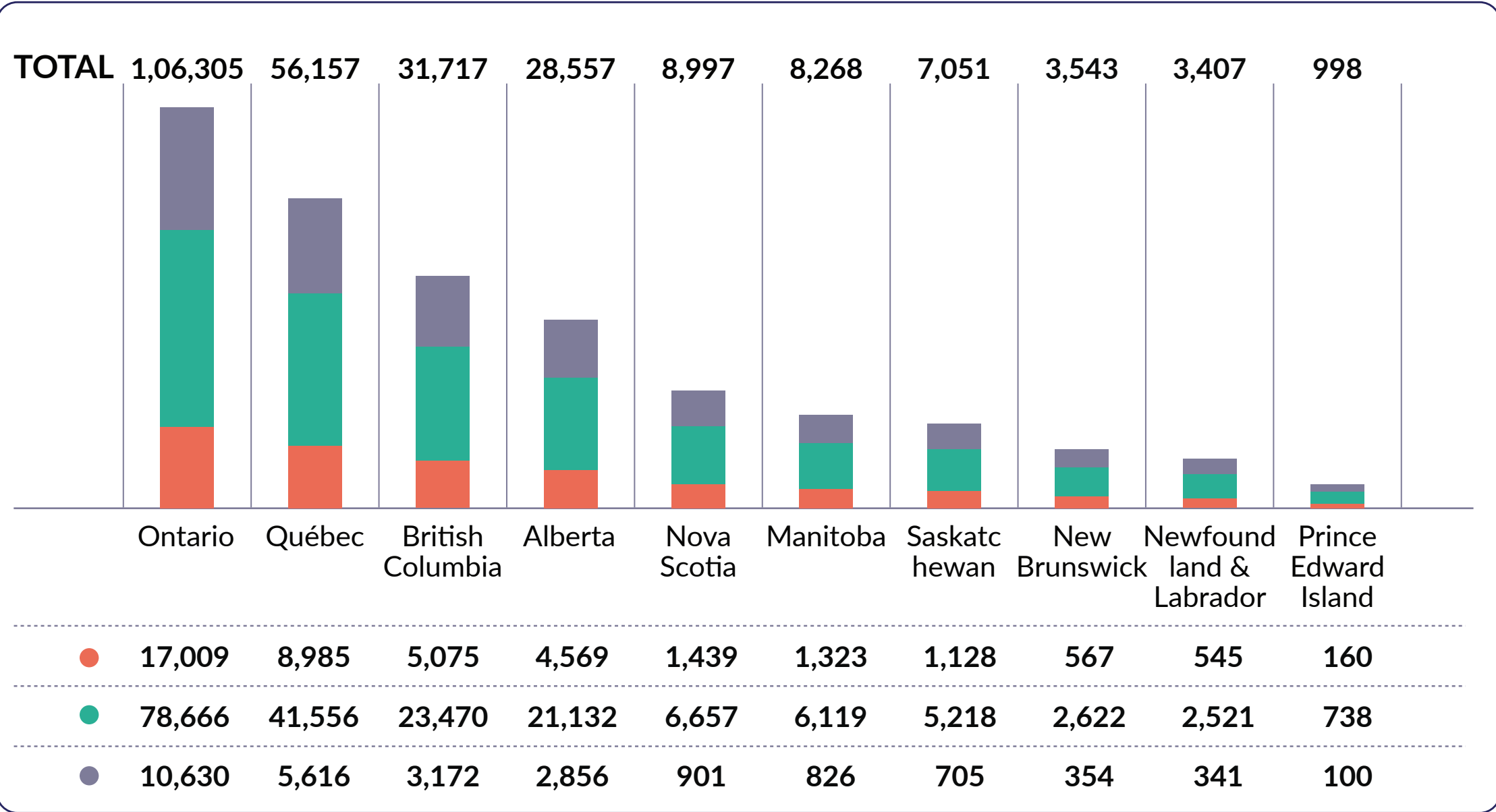

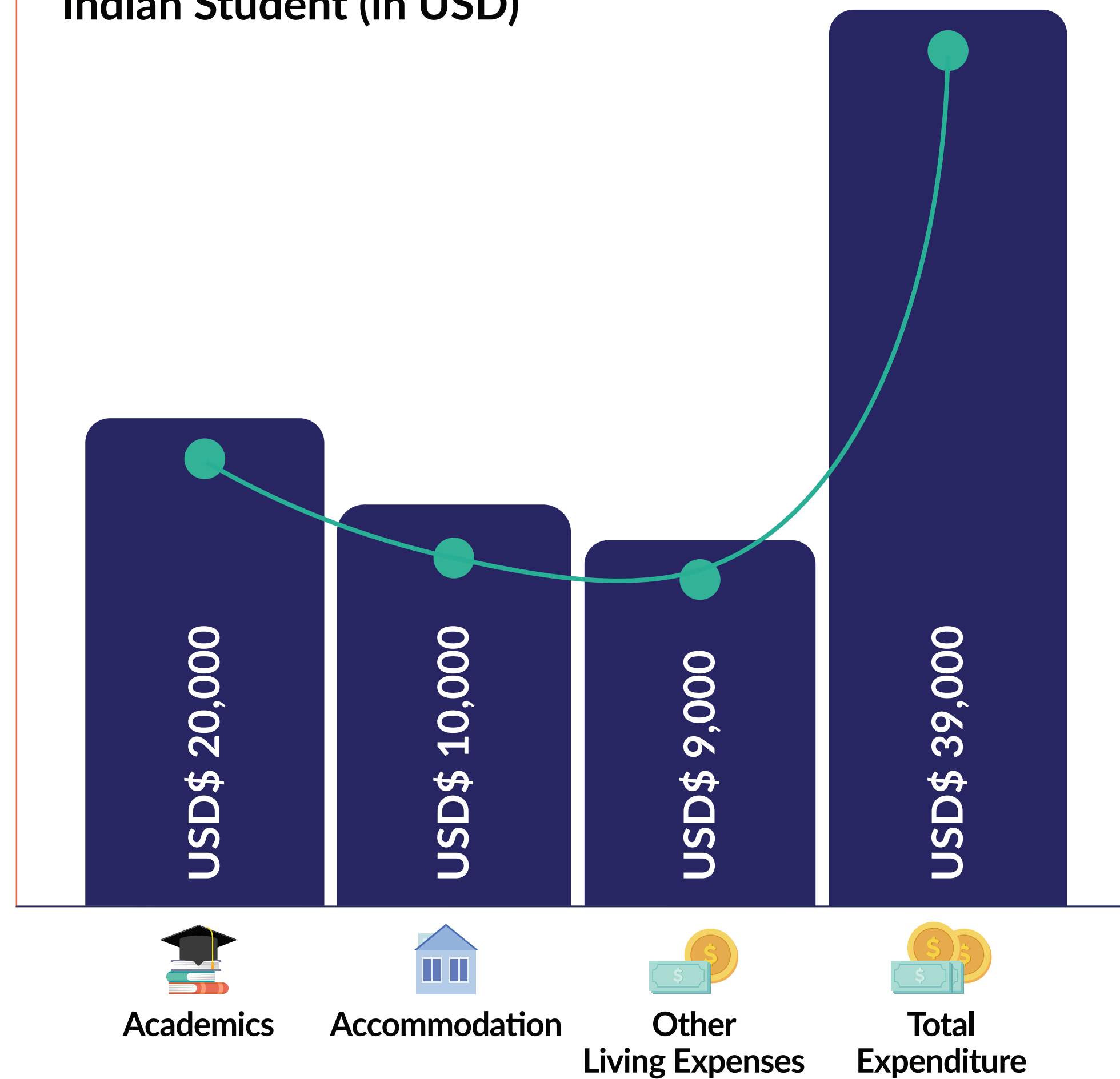

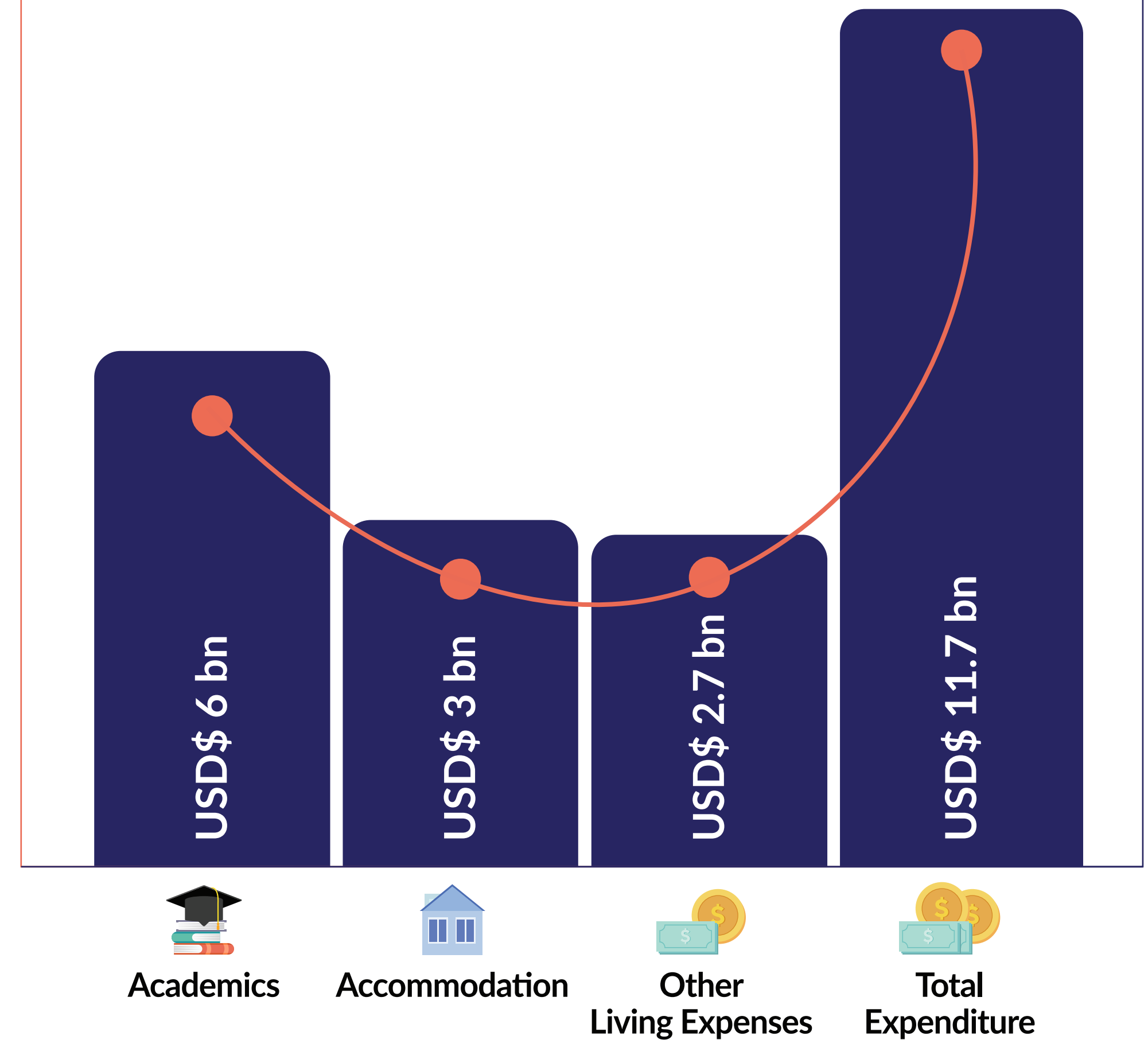
Average Expenditure per Indian Student (in USD)

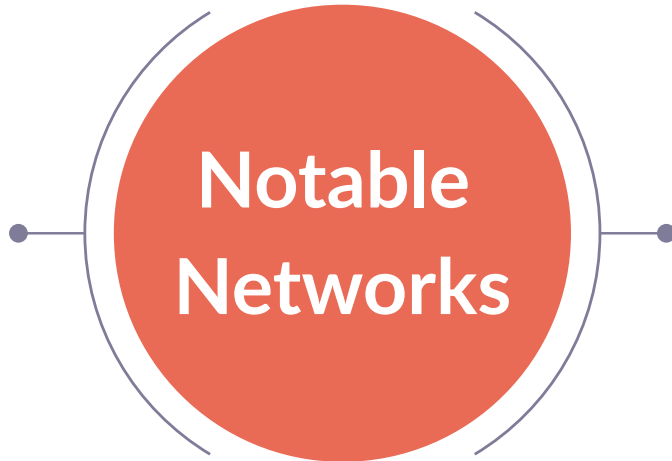

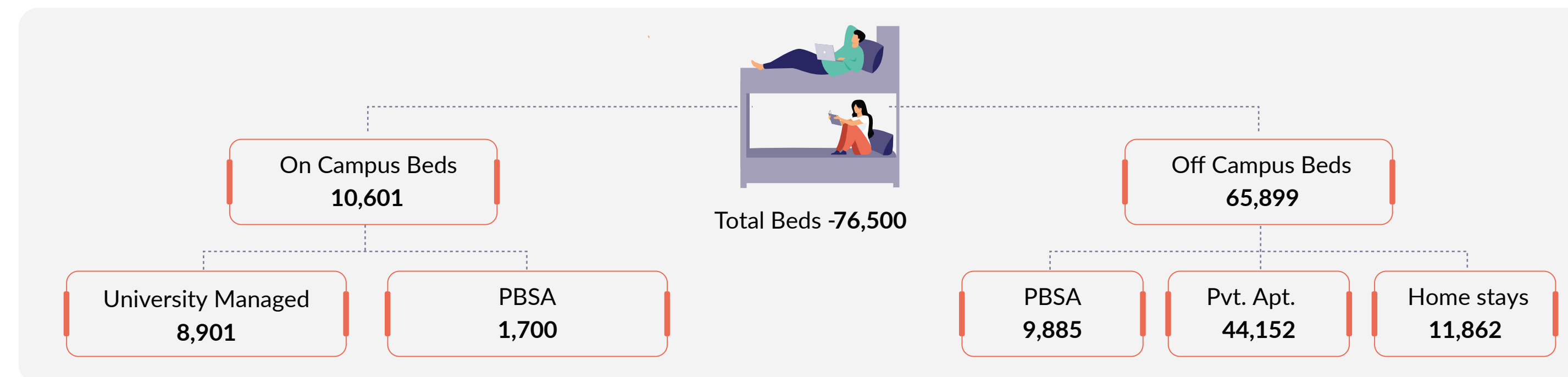
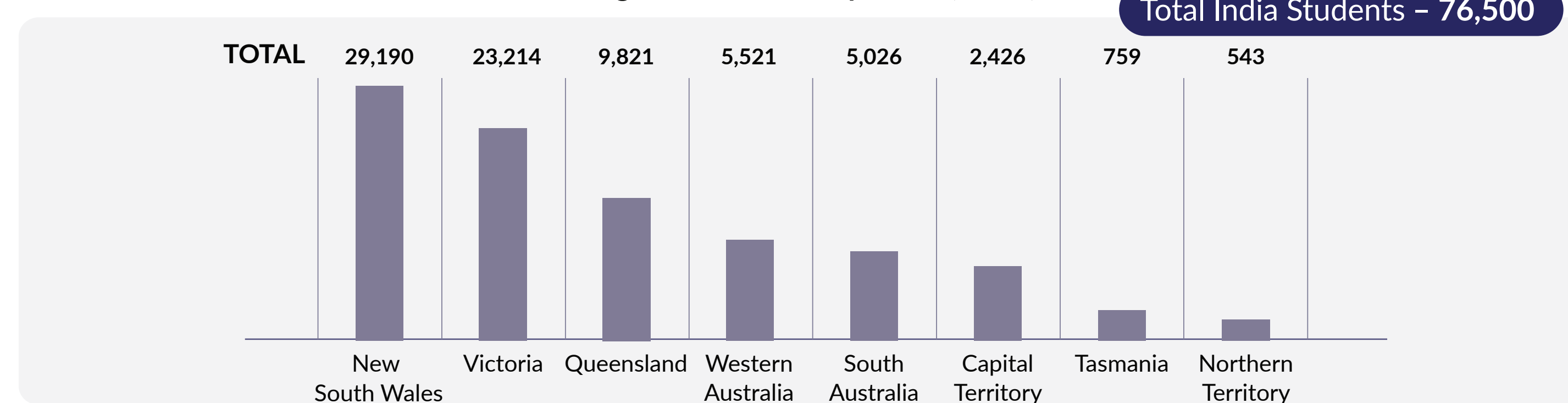


Exhibit 42: Indian Students Enrollment in Higher Education by State (2023)



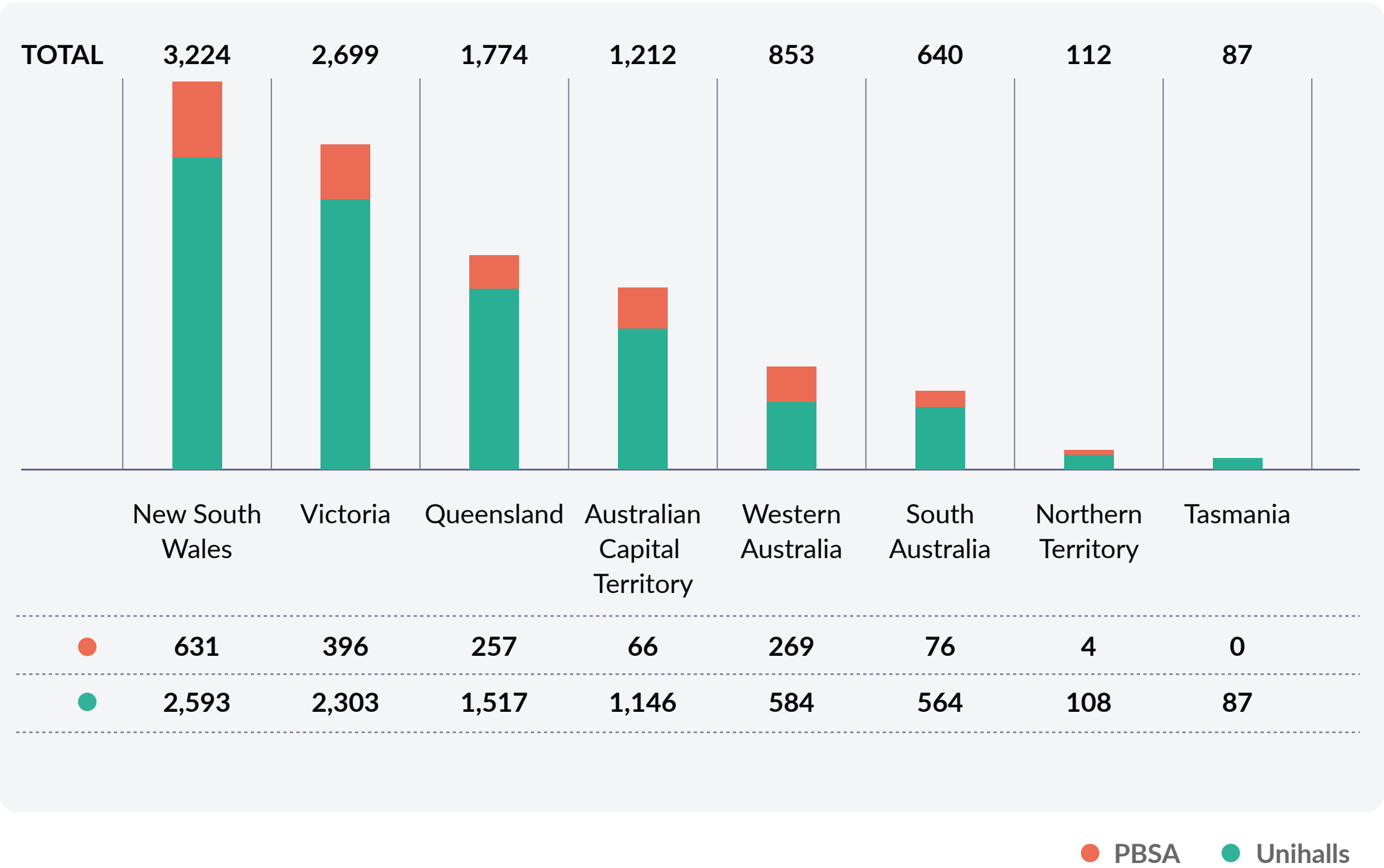
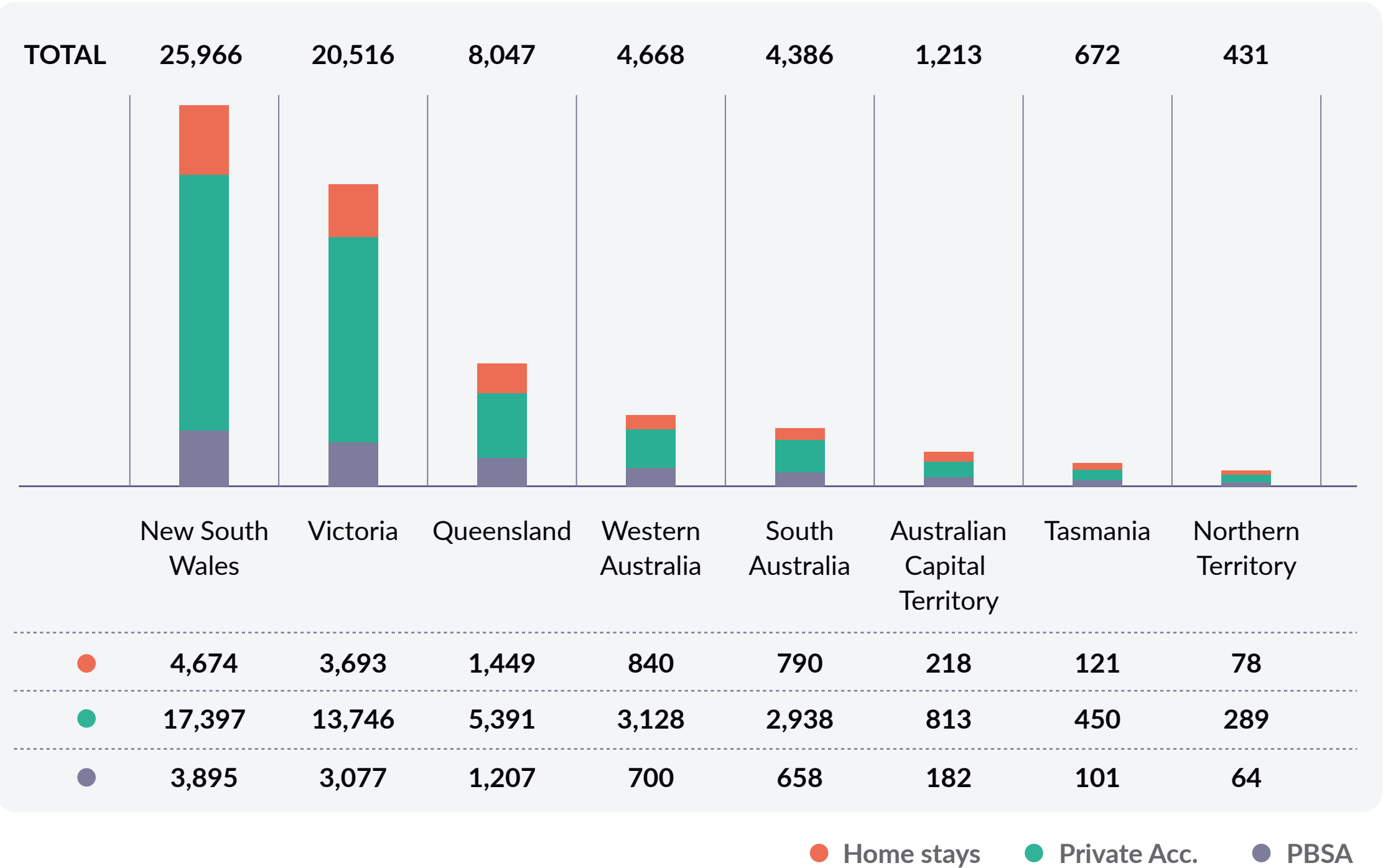

Average Expenditure per Indian Student (in USD)

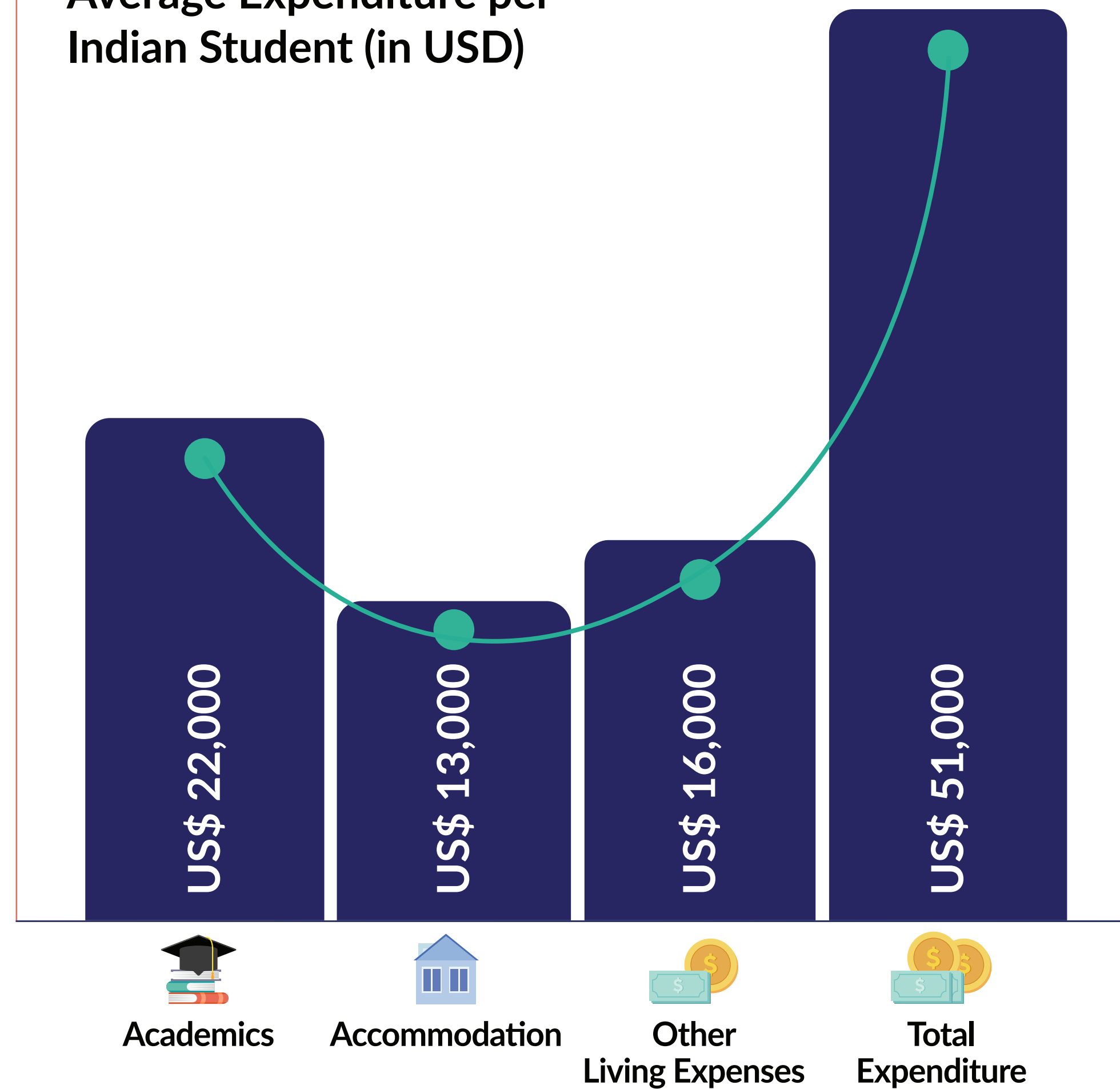
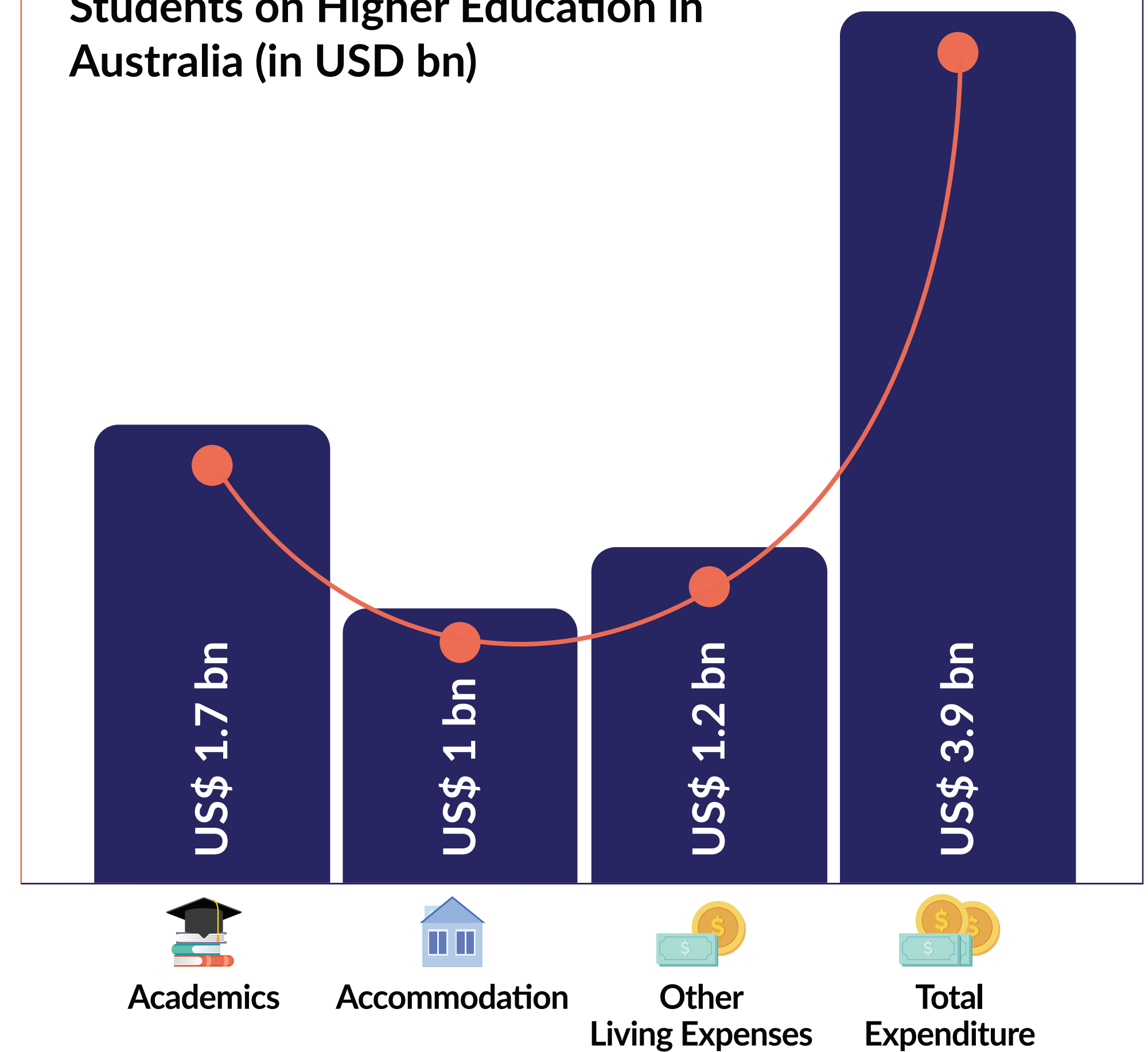

Some Important Immigration Updates

From 1 October 2023, international students will need to show evidence of \$24,505 in savings, which is a 17% increase on current levels.

The government will apply additional scrutiny to high-risk cohorts and ask for additional documents to prevent fraud in the international students' applications.

According to the Australian Bureau of Statistics, 131,640 international students arrived in the country in July 2023, an increase of 60,420 students on the same period last year.

From 1 July 2023, work restrictions for student visa holders will be capped at 48 hours per fortnight.

Key Insights

The government will strengthen the criteria for education provider registration and prevent cross-ownership between education providers and agents. Furthermore, agent commissions on student transfers between providers will be prohibited to deter unethical practices. These actions are aimed at closing loopholes that allowed students to switch providers for work rather than educational purposes.

To ensure the integrity of the international students Australia will no longer let international students enroll in two courses concurrently during the first six months of their principal course of study. This change in rule is intended to crack down on 'dodgy' education providers that have been misusing the concurrent enrollment policy to encourage students to switch institutions.

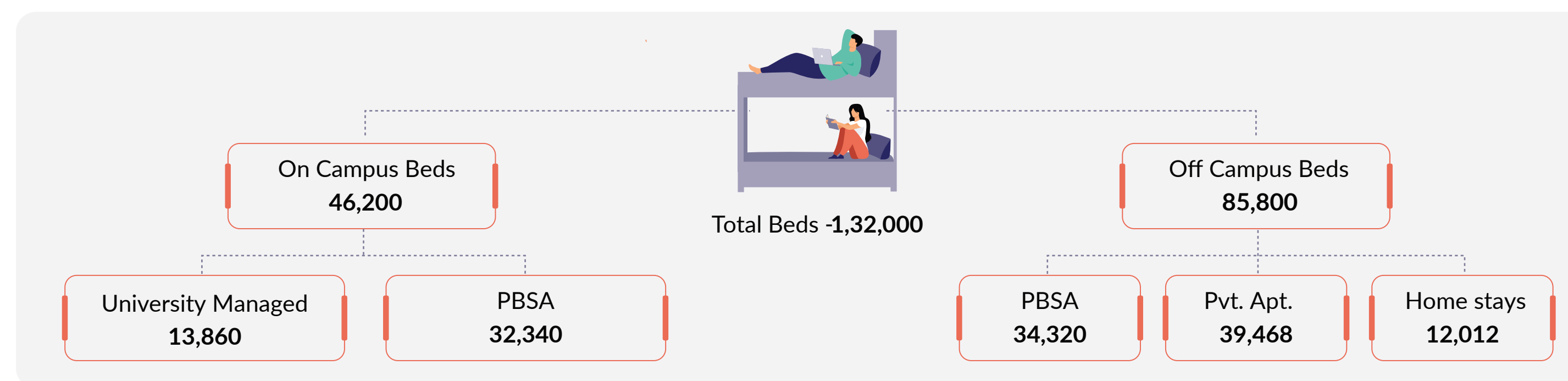
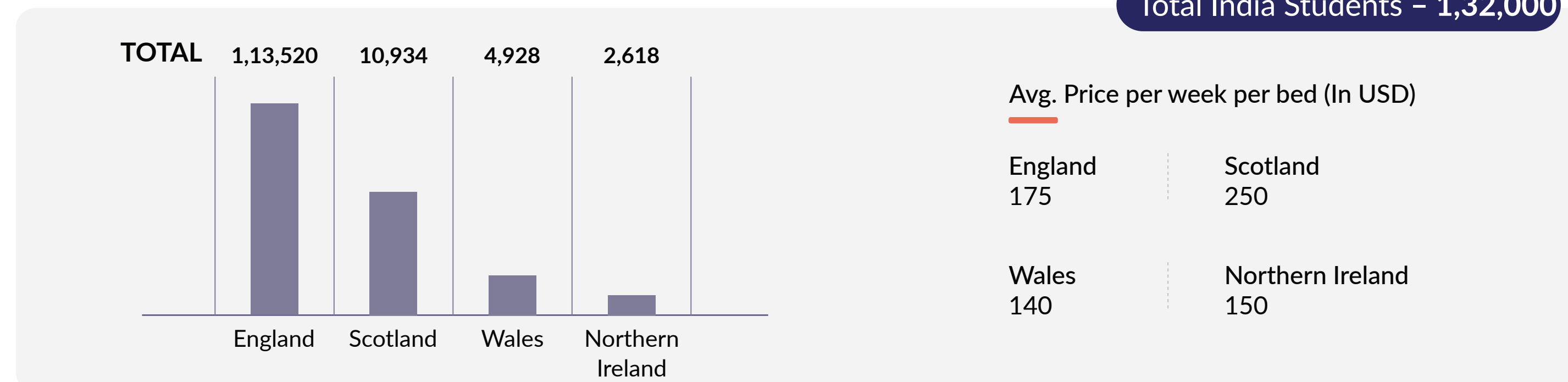


Exhibit 53: Indian Students Enrollment in Higher Education by Country ('23)

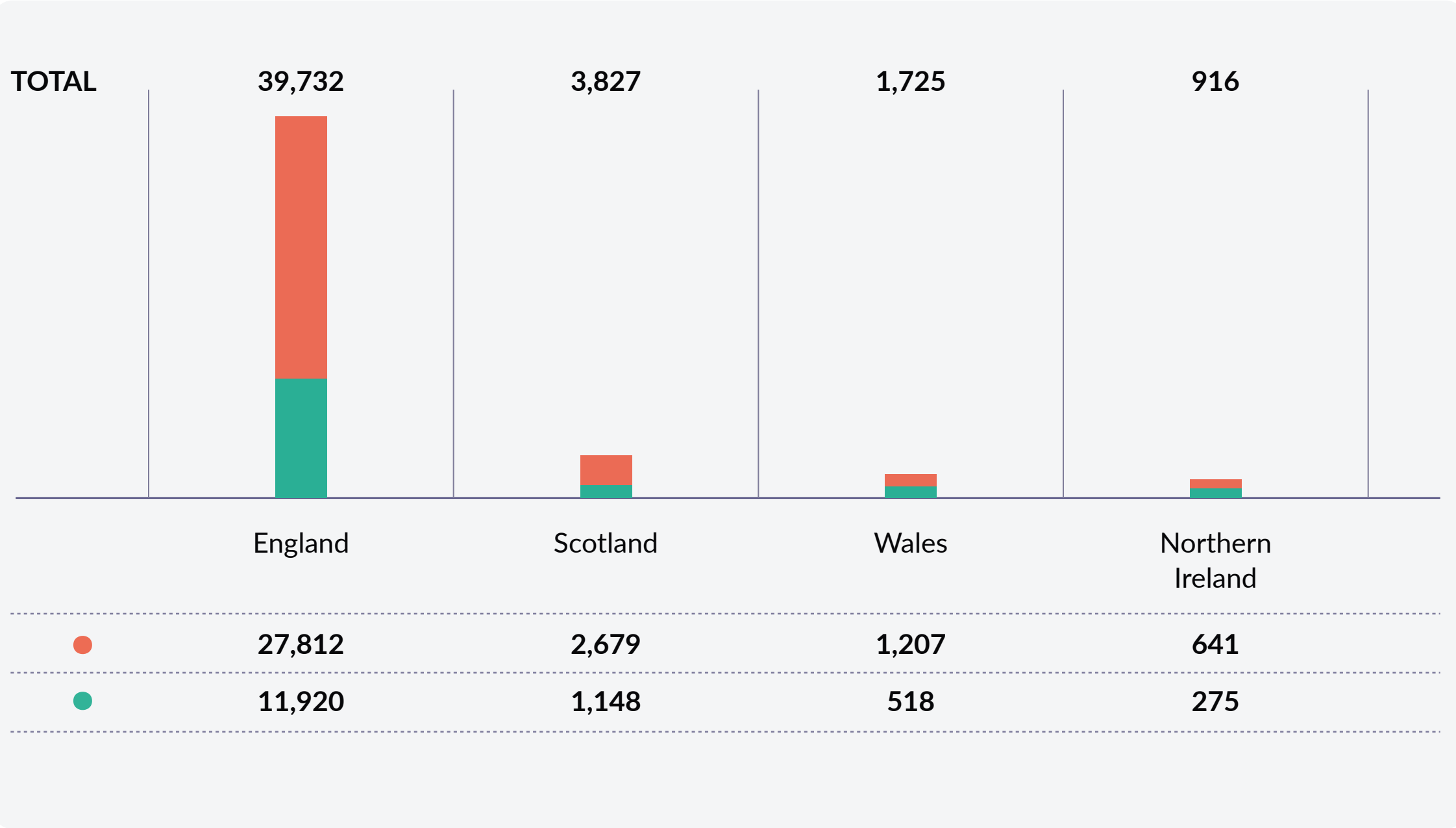
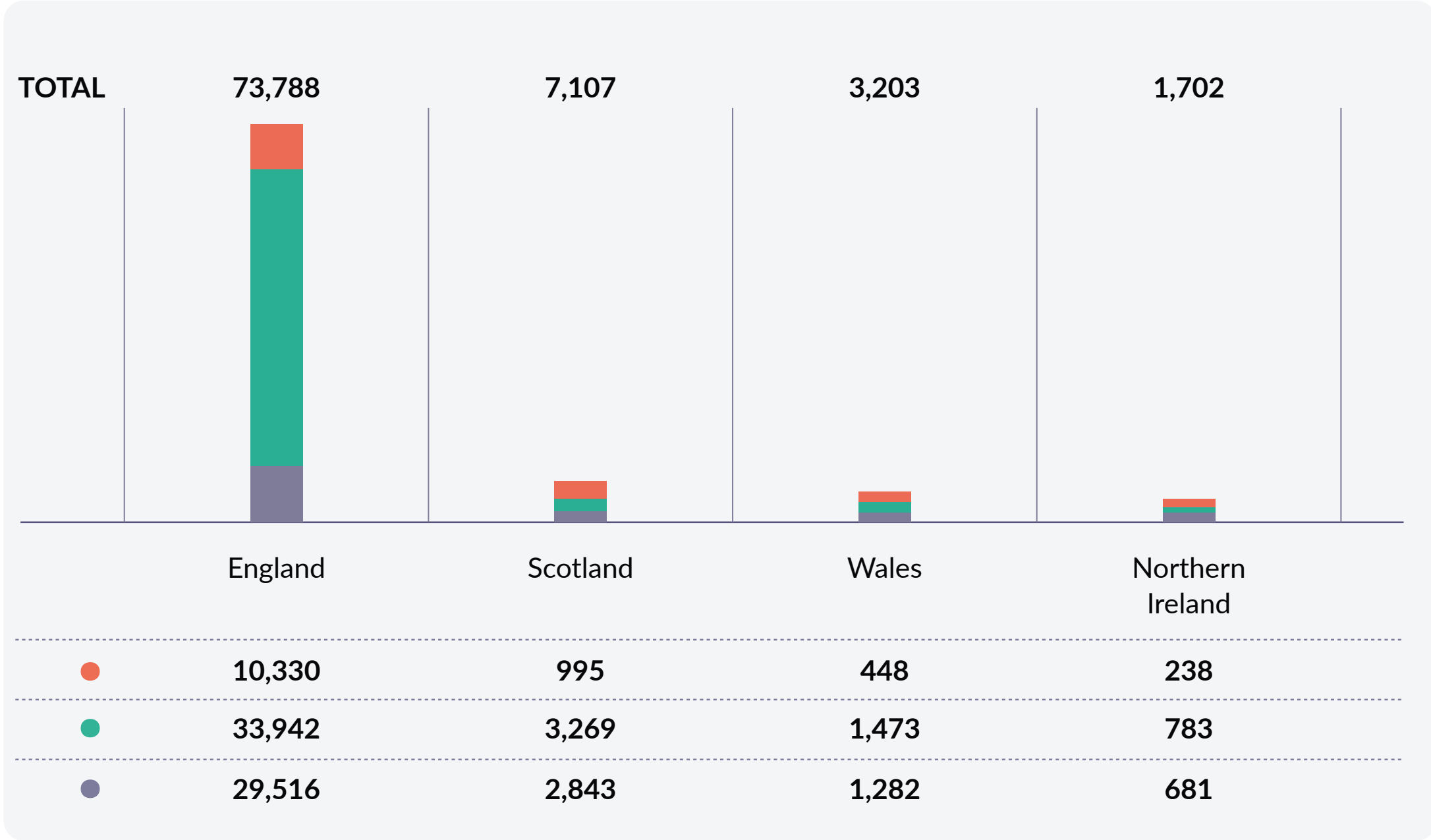

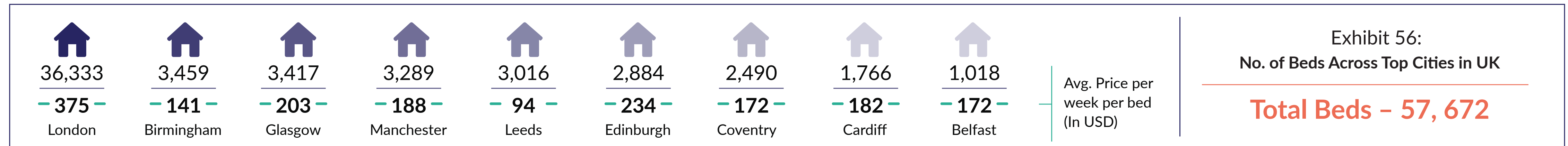

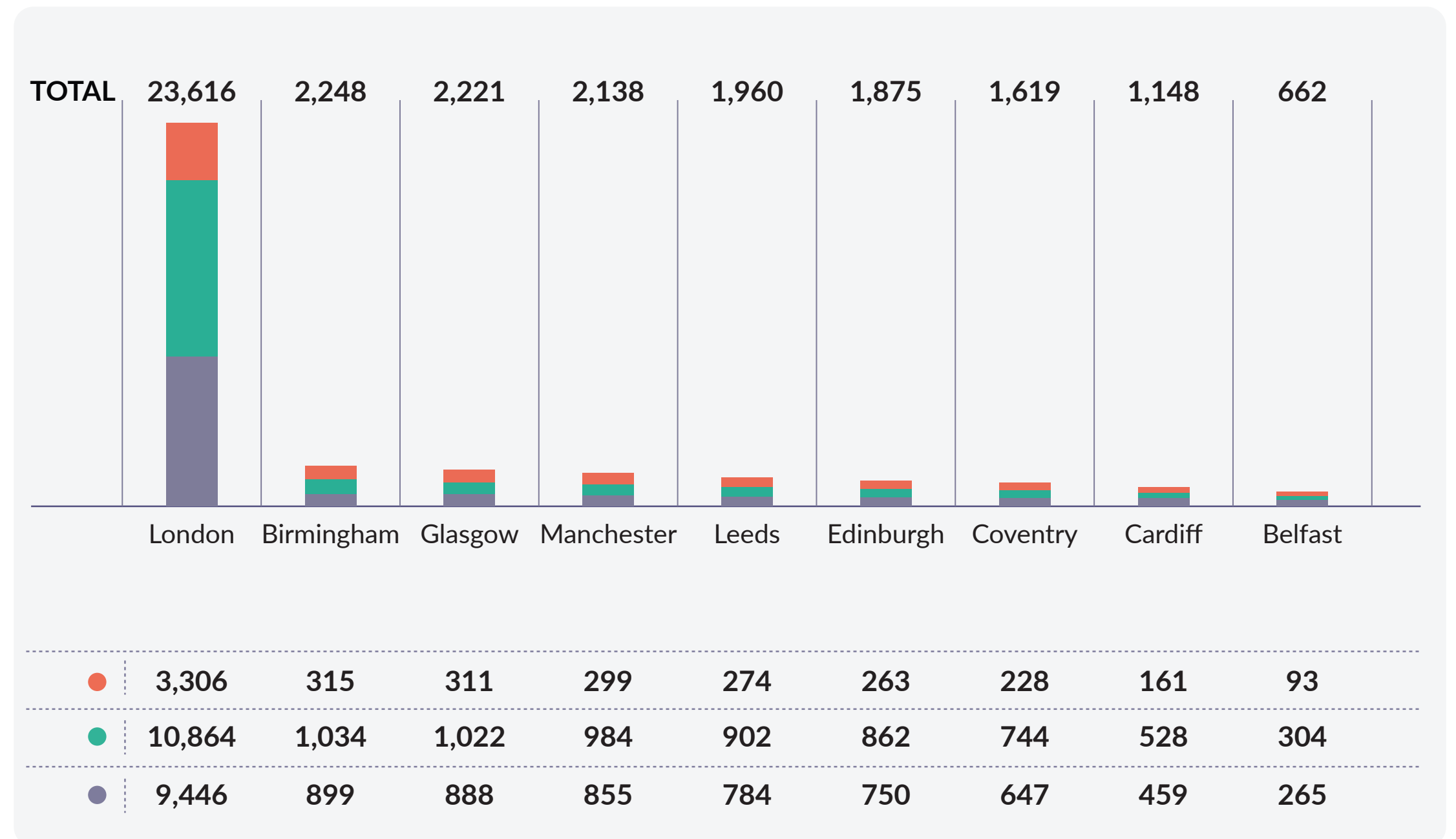

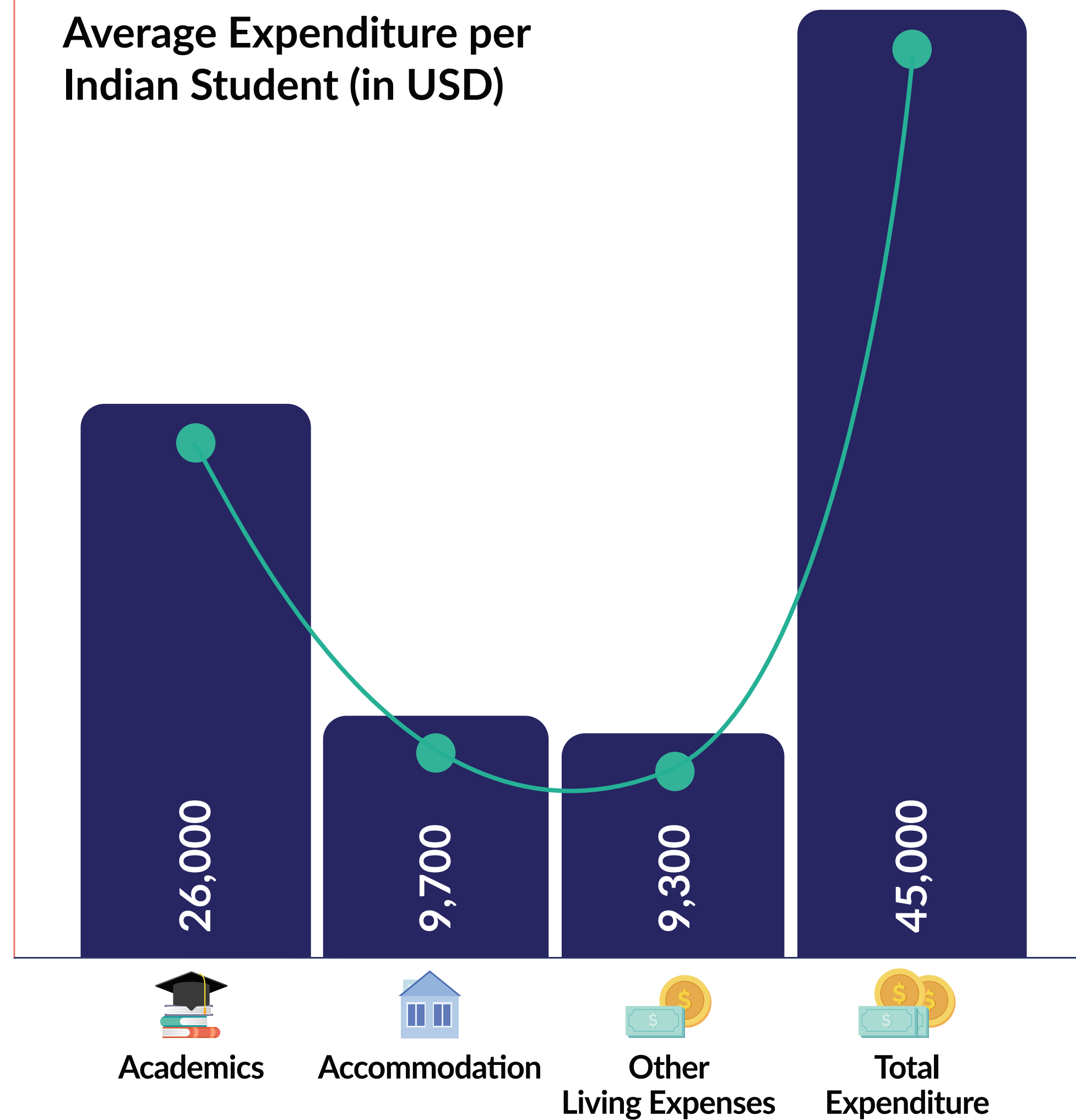

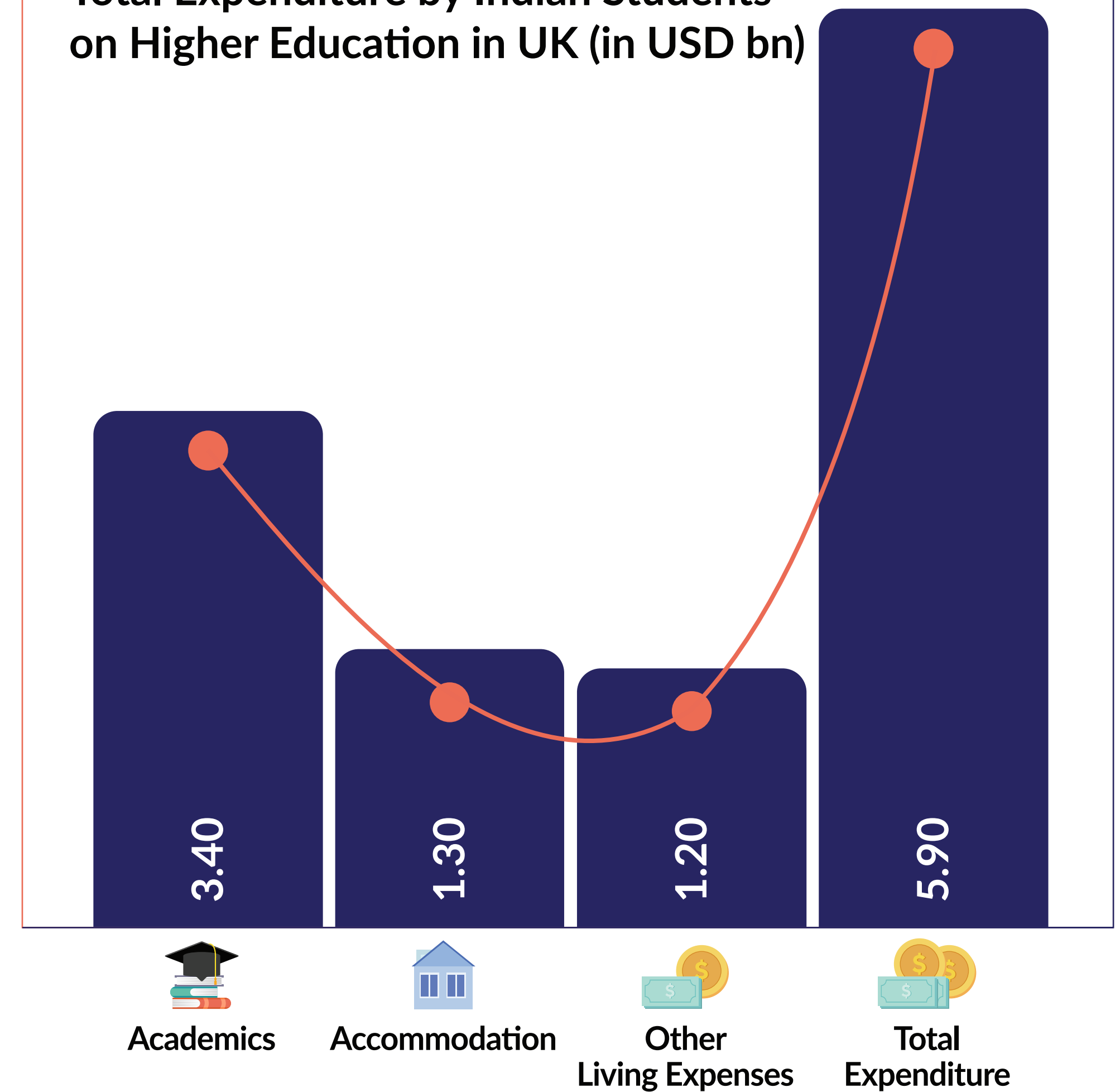

This chapter explores the dramatic shift in study abroad market, marked by increased student Enrollment and their paying capacity. This rise isn't limited to domestic students, with international Enrollment also growing significantly across the anglophone countries.

2

It has been observed that the current student accommodation booking process is extremely inefficient and fraught with high dropout rates of transactions (~50%) primarily on account of lack of availability of real time data on the supply side. On top of this there are significant drop out rates from the demand side as well (~25%), which makes almost 75% of the transactions susceptible to failure. There are also significant human interventions required to make the deal go through, which makes the entire process inefficient, to say the least.

3

The real-time seat booking information for flights is shared with multiple booking sites through a mechanism called Global Distribution Systems (GDS). These are large computer networks that allow real-time transactions between travel service providers (like airlines) and travel agencies (like online booking sites).

4

The above statistics point to the fact that there is clearly an opportunity for a private player to address this gap and make some money out of it. Any efficiencies brought into this system will, over a period of time, save time & tons of money and also improve the student's accommodation booking experience. Interestingly, this is not a new problem or a problem, which the travel & tourism industry has not solved in the past.

5

These are platforms like Amadeus, Sabre, and Travelport (Galileo, Worldspan) that aggregate this data from different airlines. The GDS communicates with the airlines' inventory systems through a standardized protocol, allowing the GDS to pull real-time data. Global Distribution Systems (GDS) typically generate revenue through transaction fees charged for each booking made using their system. These fees are paid by the airline, hotel, or other travel service provider.

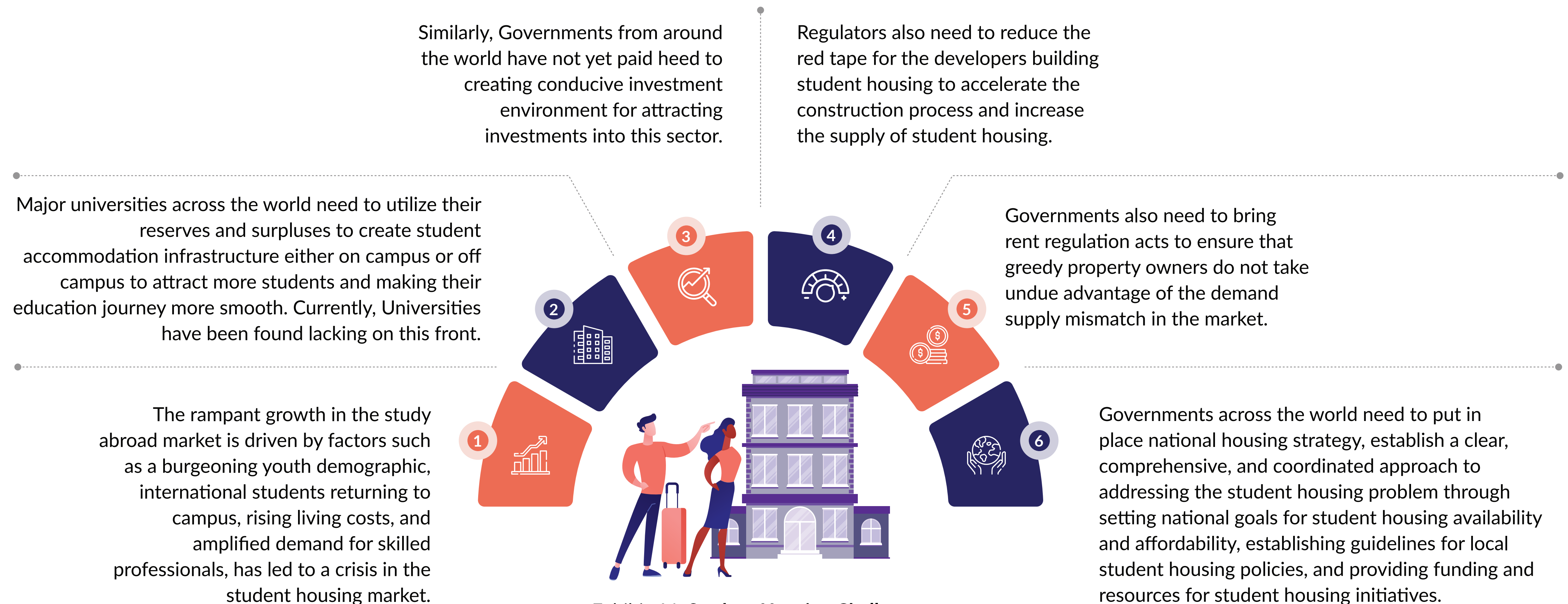
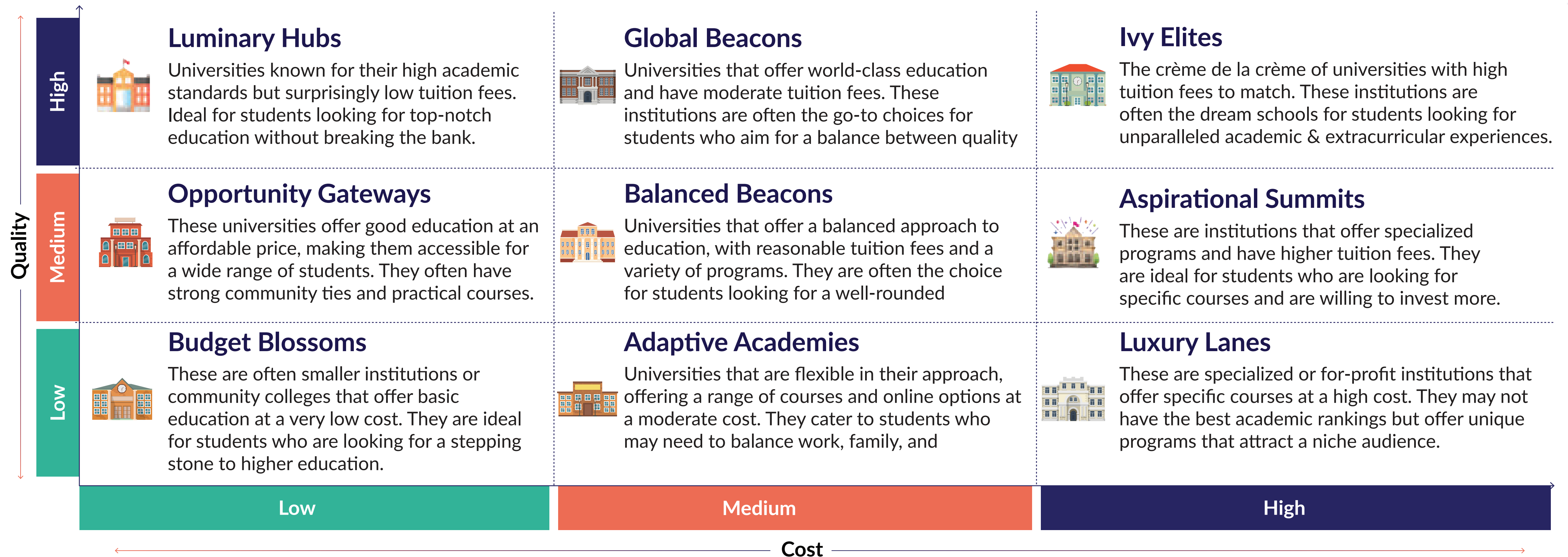


Exhibit 64: Student Housing Challenges

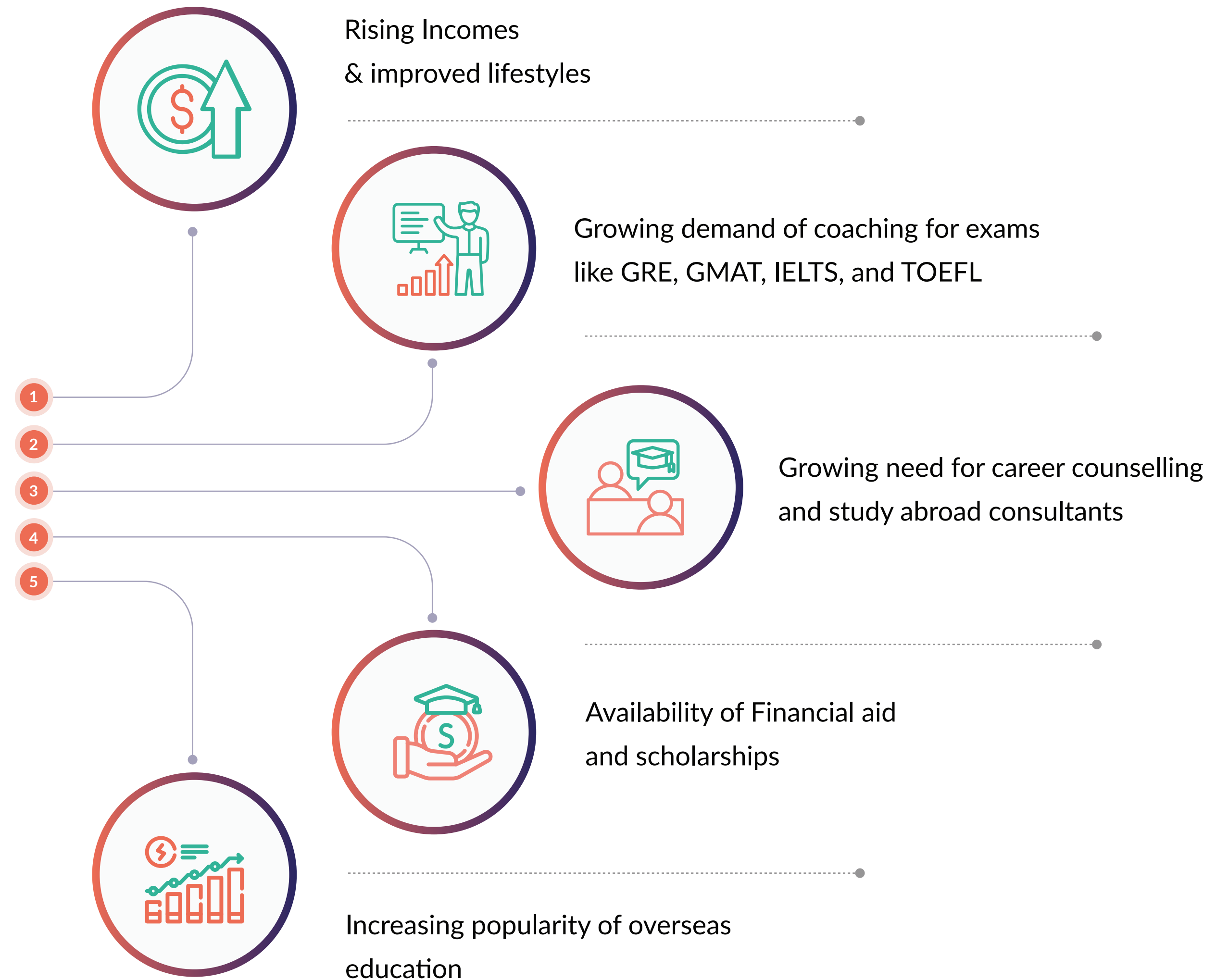

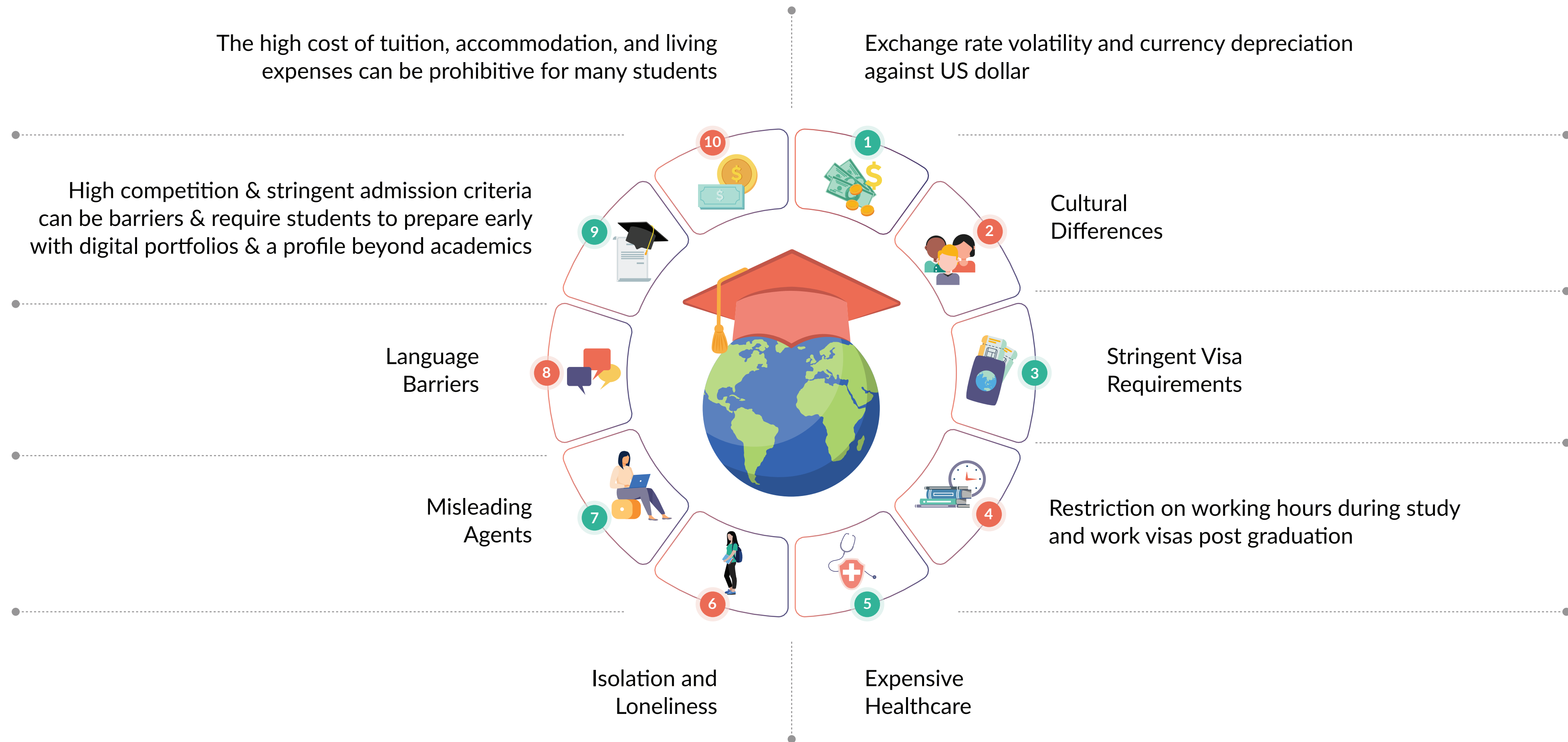


Exhibit 66: International Education - Opportunities

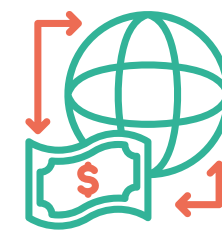

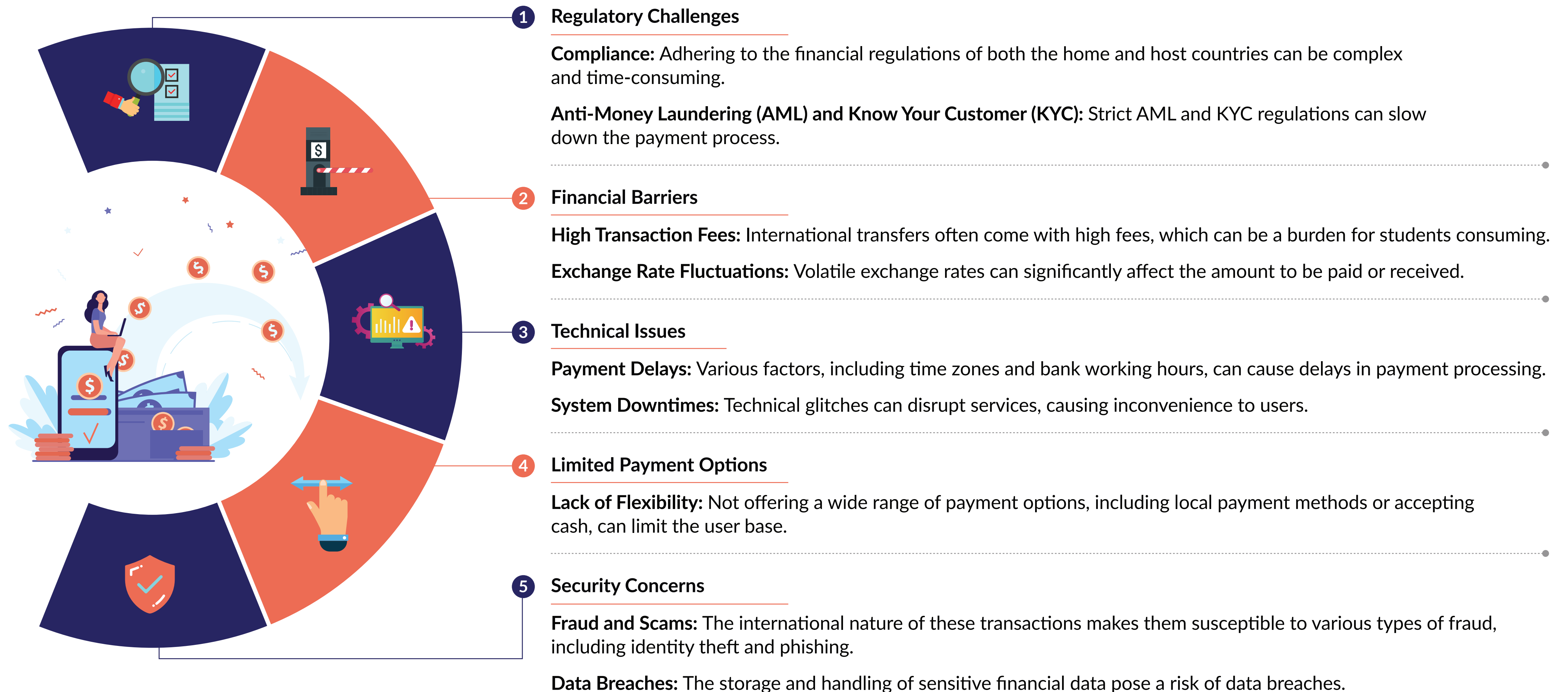

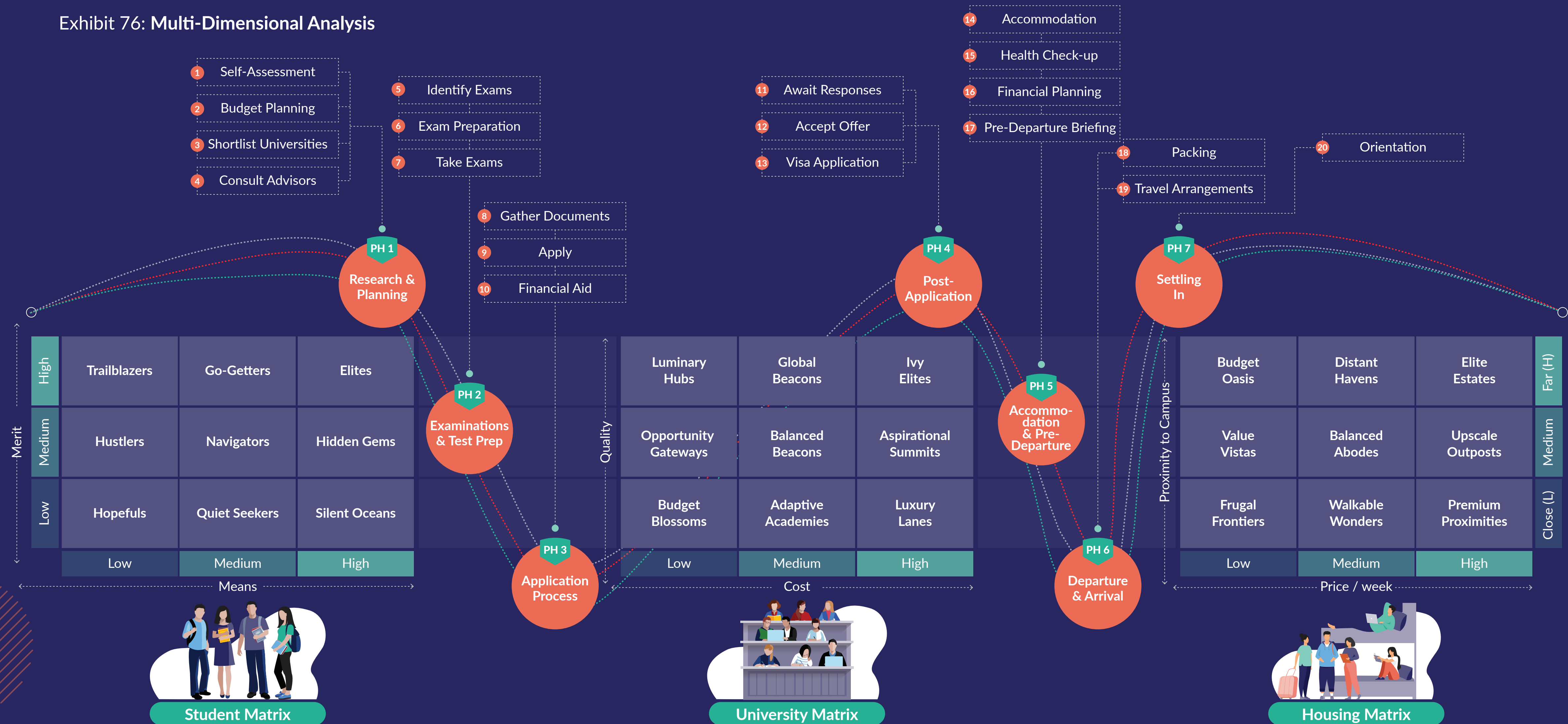

1 In order to understand the future outlook and evolution of the Student Housing Market, we need to first see how the market has evolved in the past few decades.

2 The exhibit here provides an overview of the evolution of student housing, from its early, basic dormitory-style beginnings to the ultra-high-tech, highly personalized, and sustainable living spaces of today and the future. Each era of student housing is defined by a unique set of features, unique selling points (USPs), and value-added services that reflect the changing needs, preferences, and lifestyles of students across different generations.

3 From Student Housing 1.0 in the pre-1990s era, when simplicity, affordability, and convenience were the primary focus, to the current era of Student Housing 5.0, where the emphasis is on integrating advanced technology, personalized living experiences, and sustainability. Each era has significantly contributed to reshaping student living experiences.

Key Recommendations

What is important to note here is that all the key stakeholders on the supply side will have to work together to help transform the current student housing landscape.

Online marketplaces can also play a pivotal role. They can effectively deploy the technological solutions that could help match students with compatible roommates and affordable shared housing arrangements.

These strategies aim to address the complexities and dynamics of the student housing market in the realm of International education. Implementing these strategies could lead to improvements in the entire study abroad journey of students and their living conditions, better utilization of resources, and more sustainable growth in the sector. We encourage policy-makers, educational institutions, housing providers, and other stakeholders to consider these strategies in their future plans.



Even Universities, PBSA players and investors will have to invest in the sector. Investing in student housing infrastructure would have a number of benefits for the entire ecosystem. First, it would make it easier for students to afford to attend university. Second, it would help to reduce the stress and anxiety that students often experience when trying to find affordable housing. Third, it would help to create a more vibrant and inclusive education communities both on the campus and around it.

The governments around the world can fulfill this responsibility by having a national student housing strategy and investing in student housing infrastructure. This could involve building new student accommodation, providing subsidies or tax incentives to private developers who build student accommodation, or providing grants to students to help them with the cost of rent. Some of it is happening as well but it does not seem enough.

Conclusion

- The uneven distribution of various housing types across regions, coupled with disparities in affordability and quality, highlight the complexity of the student housing market.
- Government policies and regulations have played, and will continue to play, a crucial role in shaping the student housing market. These include measures to ensure affordability, safety, and accessibility, as well as incentives for investment in PBSA.
- A continued focus on innovation, regulation, and investment, aligned with the needs and preferences of the student population, will be essential for its future development and

Exhibit 78: Total HE Institutions and Indian Students as a % of International Students

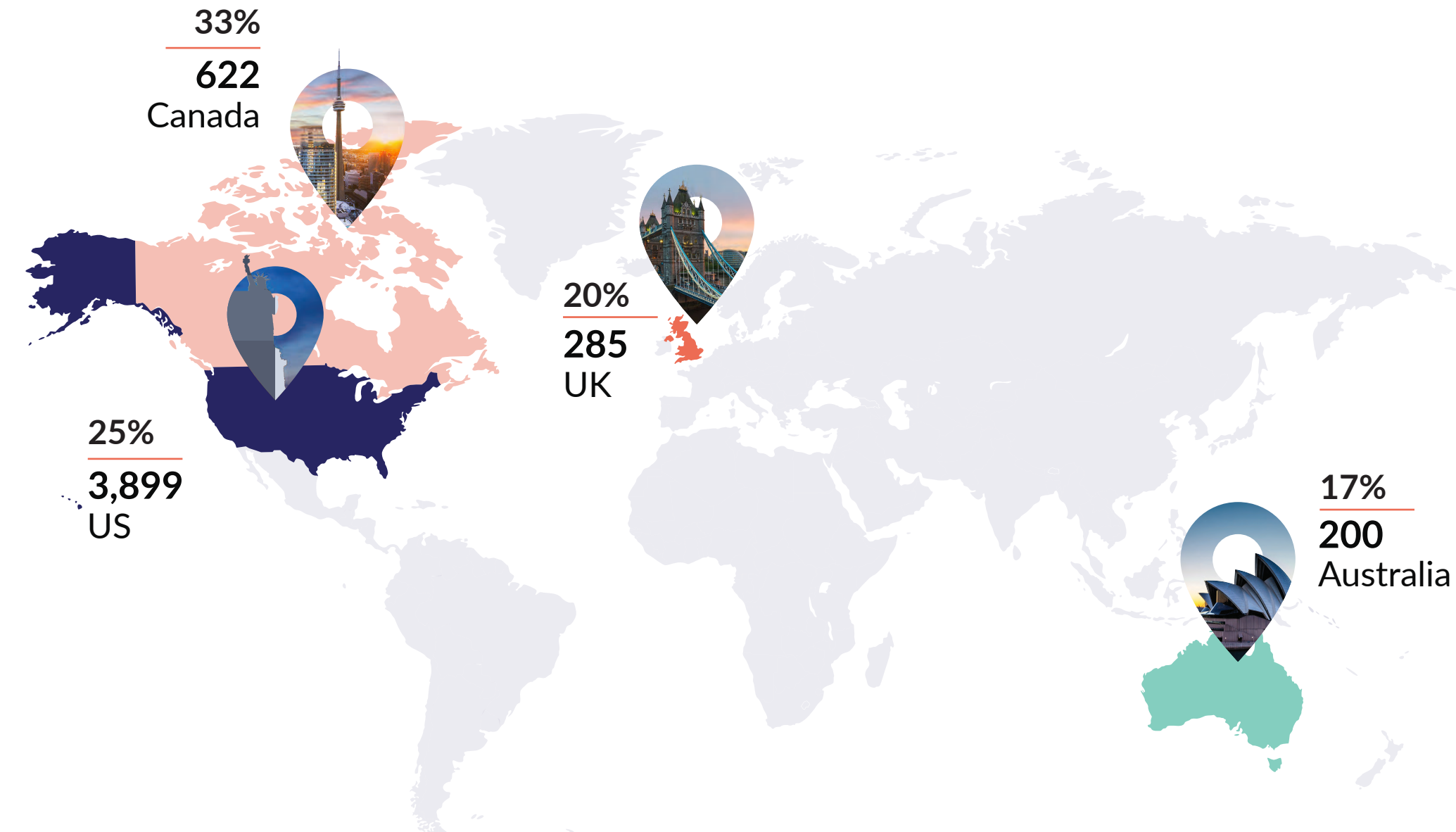


Exhibit 79: Total Expenditure by Indian Students Studying Abroad in HE ('23)

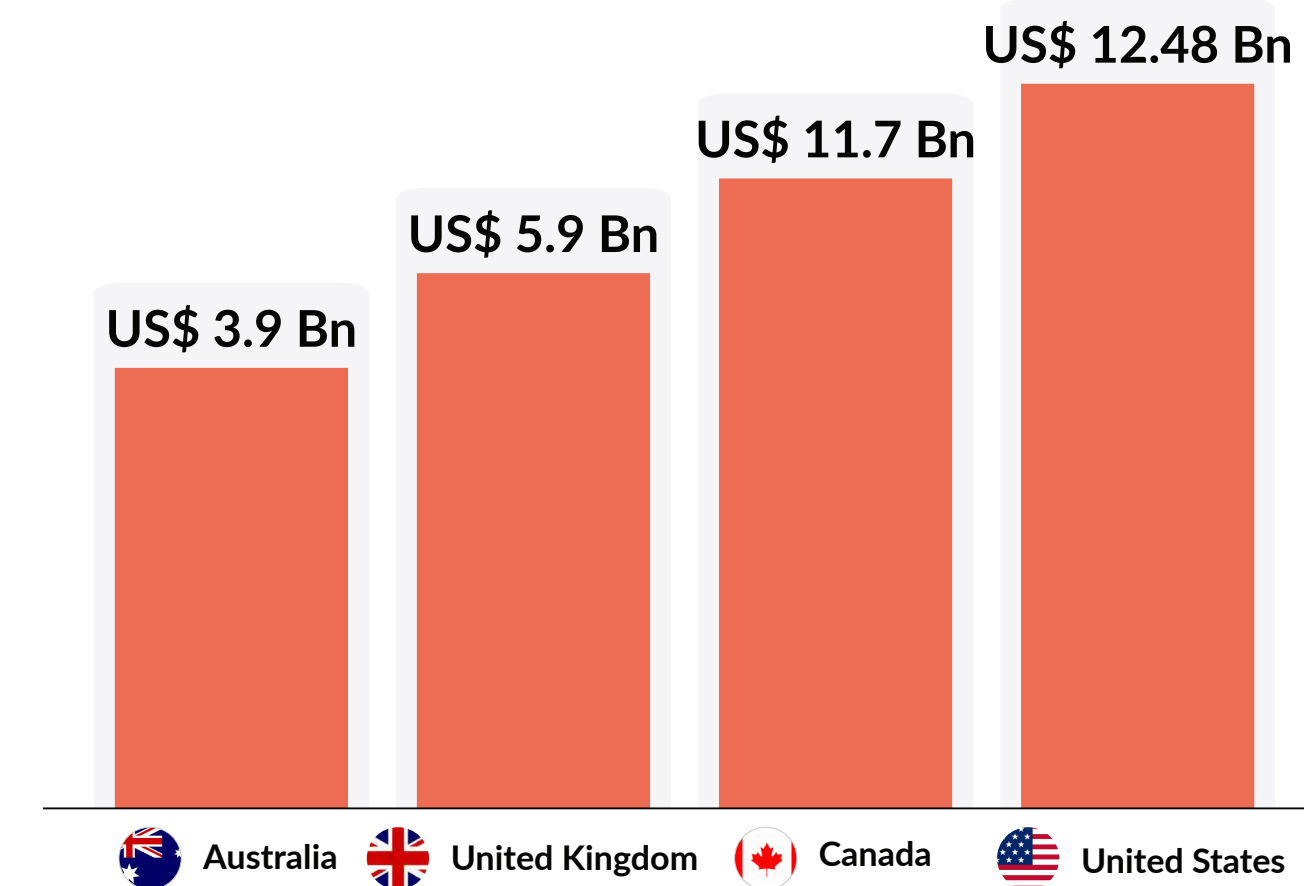
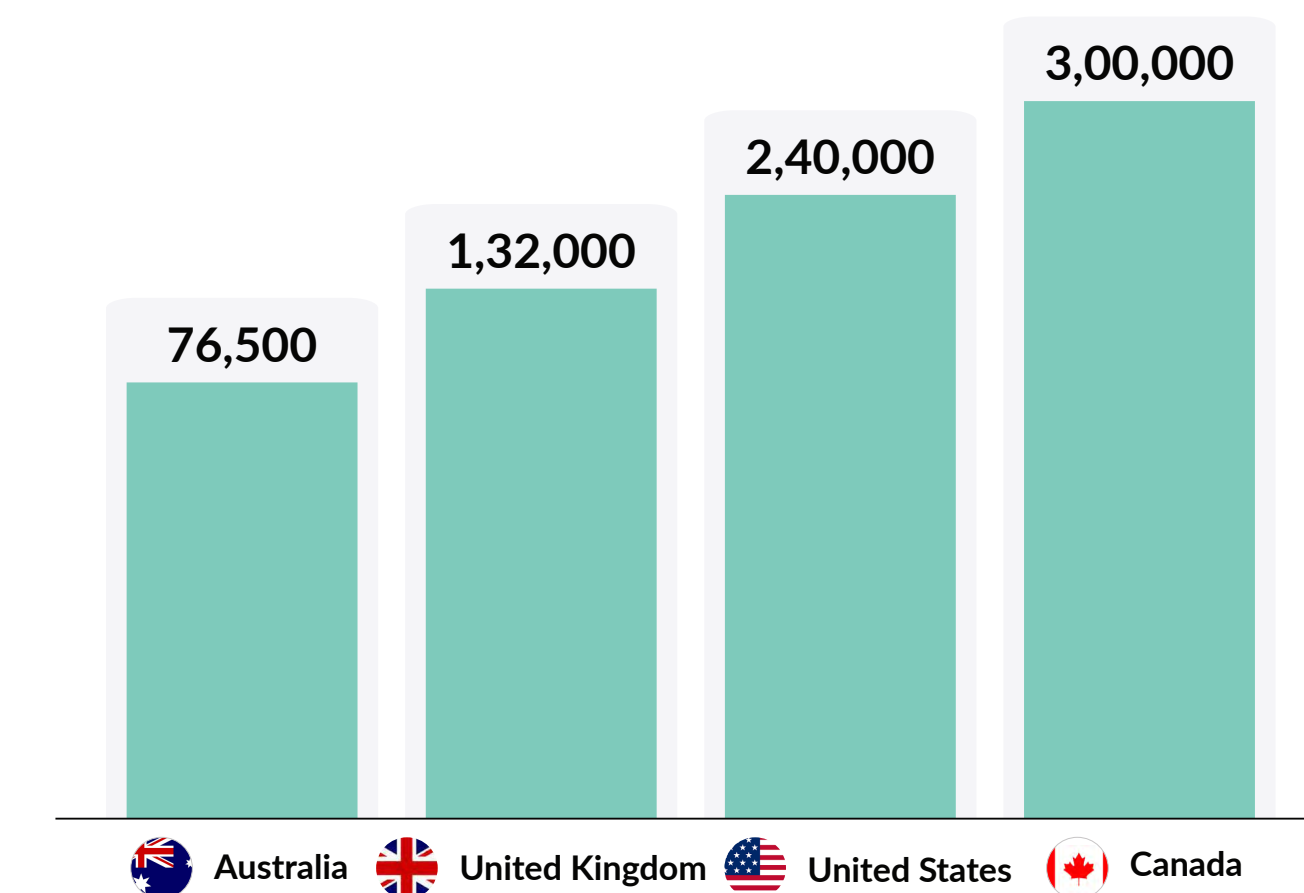


Exhibit 80: Total Number of Indian Students Studying Abroad in HE ('23)

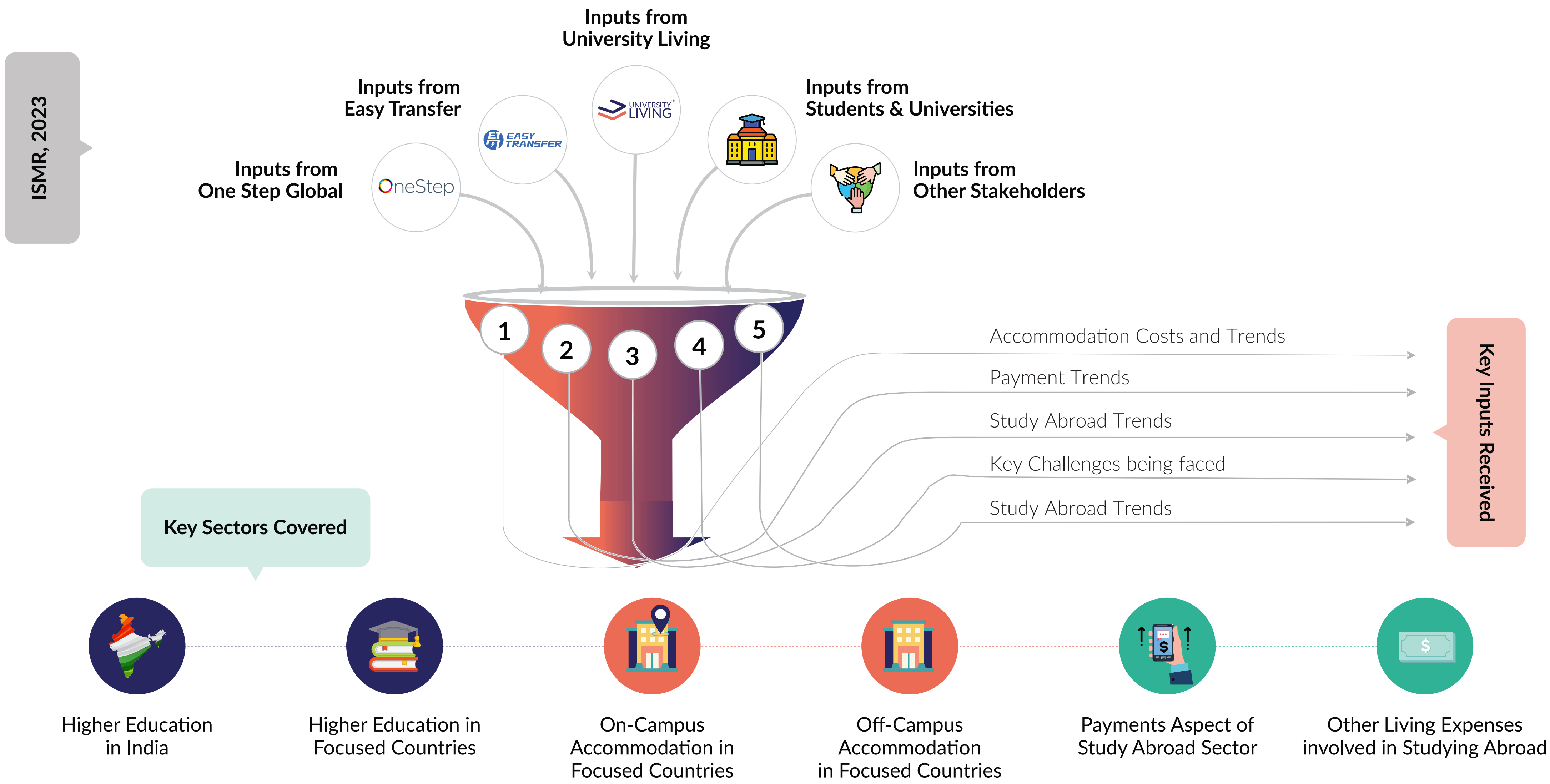

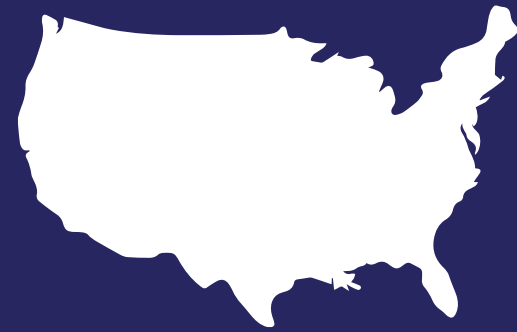
